



TOPIC: "GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH IN THE LOWER SOUTH"

EDITOR'S NOTE: RICHARD S. LACKEY, a native of Mississippi, received his B. S. from Mississippi State University and his M. S. from the University of Southern Mississippi. He and his wife, Saralyn Lackey, and their daughter, Ellen Lackey, reside at Forrest, Mississippi where Mr. Lackey presently manages family business interests.

Mr. Lackey has been active in the field of Genealogy for over twenty years. He is a Certified Genealogist and serves as Trustee for the Board for Certification of Genealogists. He lectures at the National Archives' Institute on Genealogical Research in Washington, D. C., the Institute on Genealogical and Historical Research sponsored by Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama, and is co-director of the Institute on Genealogy and Family in Houston, Texas. He is past President of the Mississippi Genealogical Society and a former trustee of the Mississippi Historical Society. He is also an active member of the Sons of the American Revolution, Sons of Confederate Veterans, Order of the Stars and Bars and First Families of Mississippi. Mr. Lackey has lectured widely, especially on topics relating to research in the Deep South and to Federal Land Records.

He has for many years contributed articles for publication in various periodicals. "The Genealogist's First Look at Federal Land Records" was published last year in Prologue: The Journal of the National Archives. He was co-editor of the Mississippi Genealogical Exchange for eight years. Mr. Lackey is a Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists and author of "Mississippi" (Chapter XII) in Genealogical Research Volume II which was published by that organization. His most recent book, Frontier Claims in the Lower South, was published by Polyanthos, Inc. Mr. Lackey presently, actively engages in numerous programs associated with the field of genealogy, such as his participation with the Mississippi Committee on the Humanities Oral History Seminar and "Kin and the Community" sponsored by the Smithsonian.

Mr. Lackey's interest in genealogy is not confined to his own family, but includes most ante-bellum Southern families. He has conducted personal studies for genealogical sources at most of the major record repositories in the country. Most of his lectures include material from unpublished notes made during the course of his genealogical investigations.

GIFT BOOKS RECENTLY DONATED TO THE ARKANSAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY LIBRARY By R. W. Dhonau

"Historical Sketch of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church of Ebenezer, Tippah County, Mississippi" This is a 61 page reprint of the original book published in 1881. It was written by Rev. H. H. Robinson, who was pastor of the Church for thirty years, with added sketches of Pastor's Lives by Rev. S. A. Agnew. Subsequently History was written in 1916 by a ruling elder, H. B. Wiseman, who was a son-in-law of Rev. H. H. Robinson, and from one of the oldest and most loyal families of the Church.

This is a valuable genealogical source that also shows the inter-relation of religious activity and civil history. The biographical sketches of at least seven of its pastors is full of names and finally there is a listing of the deceased members of the Church by name and date of death from December 11, 1850 through September 1916.

The Church was formally organized July 16, 1842, and Charter members included the family names of Jones; McBride; Liddell, and Stephenson.

"Early McGraw Families of Arkansas County, Arkansas, and Their Descendants" by Carolyn Cloud Stanley (Mrs. John T.) of 15 Pine Brook Hills, Boulder, Colorado 82302. Published privately May 1978.

The introduction gives a logical connection of the documented evidence available on William McGraw, born about 1820 in Kentucky; Joseph E. McGraw, b. 25 Feb. 1818; and John McGraw, b. about 1828 in Kentucky, who probably were brothers. The father of Joseph was John McGraw, b. about 1795 in Dowling, Ireland, as shown in an extant Family Bible. He was probably the father also of William and the younger John McGraw.

The descendants of these three families are traced to Arkansas in this volume. There are excellent charts which clarify the family relationships. There are clear photographs of numerous family groups to add interest. Mrs. Stanley uses an effective numbering system to give an orderly presentation of the descendants. A full name index is included. The book with a soft-back cover is priced at \$5.00 and may be ordered from the author, whose name and address is given above.

This book was originally prepared by ARKANSAS STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION STATE - WIDE HIGHWAY PLANNING SURVEY in Co-operation with United States Department of Agriculture Bureau of Public Roads, in 1936 and reprinted in 1978 by the ARKANSAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY.

Shows: Primitive road, unimproved road, graded and drained road, metal surfaced road, paved road, navigable streams (intermittent navigation), operated ship and barge lines on natural streams commercial or municipal field, federal highway system, head of navigation (small stream), mileage between points, highway bridge, grade crossing, etc. 75 pages with index on cover. \$25.00 This is a very important and interesting Map Book. Especially helpful in trying to locate cemeteries and other important places, which have changed since 1936.

- 1 All exhibitors must be citizens of Arkansas.
- 2 All exhibits are open to amateurs only, unless otherwise stated.
- 3 All exhibits will be located in the Arts and Crafts Building.
- 4 All entries must be made in writing on printed entry forms furnished by the Arkansas State Fair and Livestock Show, Inc. for this Department, and must be postmarked by midnight September 1. Please enter your exhibits in the order of class number as scheduled in this catalog. The management reserves the right to accept or reject entries. Entry blanks will be furnished upon request to the Entry Department, Arkansas State Fair and Livestock Show, Inc. P. O. Box 907, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203.
- 5 Avoid disqualification by reading directions and information carefully.
- 6 Number of Entries - An exhibitor will be limited to one entry in each class except where specified, but may enter in all classes.
- 7 Grooming Room - A minimum of space will be available to exhibitors. Exhibitors are requested to make only a nominal amount of assembling in the building. Exhibitors must place their exhibits under the guidance of the assistant in charge.
- 8 Exhibits will be accepted as indicated at the heading of each section.
- 9 Exhibitors are requested to leave the Arts and Crafts Building as soon as their exhibit is placed.
- 10 Exhibits not properly classified by the exhibitor will not be judged. ENTRIES WILL CLOSE PROMPTLY AT THE SPECIFIED TIME. LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE JUDGED NOR DISPLAYED.

All entries must be substantiated by legal documents of public record or other acceptable records. Criteria for judging will be:

- 1 Proof verified with facsimile of original records, or by quoting title, page, publisher and date of publication if a published book or newspaper is used.
- 2 Organization of material in logical sequence.
- 3 Personal research by entrant, not just copying someone else's record.
- 4 Amount of work done by entrant as demonstrated by material gathered.
- 5 Originality and/or most interesting presentation.

Family tradition as fact, unless proven and published books that are not supported by personal research are not acceptable.

Do not make any one item for exhibit larger than 22" x 28".

Class 1 -

Most Complete Genealogy - Unpublished. Will be judged on: (1) Number of lines traced plus number of generations proved by copies of original legal documents of public, or other acceptable, records. (2) Pictures, identified as to name, date, location. (3) Memorabilia. (4) Printed material, if used in reconstruction of family history. Must show title page or source. (5) Pedigree Charts. (6) Family Group sheets for three generations.

Class 2 -

Most Complete Genealogy - Published. Will be judged on: (1) Number of lines traced plus number of generations proved by cited sources or original documents (not other published works). (2) Length. (3) System. (4) Appearance. (5) Bibliography. (6) Foot Notes. (7) Index. (8) Maps or Illustrations.

Class 3 -

Genealogy having one ancestral line traced farthest back in time. Will be judged on: (1) All generations must be substantiated by legal documents of public or other acceptable record to original immigrant. (2) Proof of identity of original immigrant and originating country. Must be supported by documentation from country or origin.

Class 4 -

Original documented genealogy of famous person, living or dead, by an Arkansas genealogist. Must be original work.

Class 5 -

Genealogy including American Indian ancestor.

- Documentation:
- a. Dawes Rolls
 - b. Henderson Rolls
 - c. Census Records
 - d. Depositions
 - e. Drennan Rolls

Class 6 -

Life in Colonies, prior to 1789. Original genealogy showing ancestry in the Colonies of America in 1789. Ancestor need not have fought in the Revolution, but entry should show as much as possible about life-style, occupation, reasons for immigration to Colonies, etc. Entry must state line/lines to be followed in judging. All collateral lines will not necessarily be judged.

Class 7 -

Young Arkansas Genealogists. Open only to students who have not reached their 19th birthday by September 29. Must be original documents from public records (or certified copies of documents). Include also, history of related land, homes, buildings and historical events or people. Must be the work of entrant.

THE STORY OF WASHINGTON GRAY AND LEONARD SCHULER

Washington Gray, my great, great grandfather, was born in South Carolina in 1787 or 1790. (The Census of 1850, Titus Co., Texas, shows his age to have been 60. The Mortality Schedule of 1860, Lamar Co., Texas, shows that he was 73 when he died in June, 1860.) Obviously his parents favored the "new government," naming their son after our first President. Who the parents were or exactly where in S. C. he was born I have been unable to determine. He probably was born in the Ninety Six District, perhaps Laurens or Abbeville County.

About 1809 or 1810 he married Phoebe ---- (Byrd?). Just when he moved to the Mississippi Territory I do not know, perhaps shortly after his marriage. My great grandmother, his first daughter, Cassandra, was born in Columbus, Mississippi, on March 18, 1816. As Columbus was not established until 1817, one year later, presumably this was scarcely a settlement in 1816. At any rate, the Grays were not staying: they were enroute to Cotaco Co., Alabama, or Morgan Co. as Cotaco became known in 1818.

According to Valley Leaves, June 1972, the Civil Register of County Officials, Vol. 1, 1819-1832 (the book in the Alabama Archives in Montgomery), shows that Washington Gray was appointed sheriff as of Oct. 28, 1819. In 1822 he was shown as Secretary to Thomas D. Crabb, one of the men who helped to form the first Constitution of Alabama. He lived in the area of Somerville, Alabama. It would appear that Washington Gray continued in Alabama until after 1825, the date when a son, Byrd W. Gray, was born.

Certainly prior to 1830 he and his family had moved into Arkansas, where he is enumerated in the Census of 1830 in Pope Co., in the area of Russellville. He stayed but a short time after 1830, however, for by 1831 he was living in Washington County, Arkansas, in the area of Vineyard Township (near Evansville).

On December 29, 1831, Leonard Schuler (Shuler) married Miss Gray (Cassandra Gray), daughter of Washington and Phoebe Gray. A notice of the marriage was published in the Arkansas Gazette on Feb. 1, 1832.

Leonard Schuler, my great grandfather, was born on July 3, 1807, in Esslingen (near Stuttgart), Wurttemberg, Germany, the youngest of the ten children of John Christopher Schuler and Catherine Barbara Silber Schuler. Leonard's father was born in Esslingen March 10, 1745, and died on October 28, 1808, when Leonard was less than two years old. His mother was born on January 26, 1765, and died January 13, 1837. The marriage occurred on Feb. 16, 1786. Leonard's grandparents were George Adam Schuler and Maria Regina Durr and John George Silber and Maria Barbara Falch, all of Esslingen. All the above are in the parish records of Esslingen, copies of which I have.

Leonard grew up in the beautiful Black Forest area of Germany. He was deeply opposed to the Prussian militaristic system of government, which was quickly spreading to all parts of Germany. Thus, sometime between 1828 and 1830 he determined to find a new home. Despite strong family opposition he and a young nephew or cousin, Gus A. Schuler, set off for the United States.

In 1830 the average time for the ocean voyage from Germany to the United States was eleven weeks. It is believed that Leonard and Gus arrived by way of Pennsylvania, traveling overland and by waterways to northwest Arkansas. On arrival in the United States or just before, Leonard and Gus decided to change the spelling of their surname from Schuler to Shuler. (Thus all Schuler records for

Mrs. Charles Chupet, 1365 So. Orange Drive, Los Angeles, Calif. 90019.

Leonard, 1831 to 1870, the date of his death, are shown Shuler.) On his deathbed he revealed the correct spelling. Gradually by 1880 or 1890 most of his descendants had changed the name back to Schuler. Why he changed the spelling we do not know. We do know that such a practice was not uncommon among immigrants.

Leonard and Cassandra lived in Vineyard, the area sometimes shown as Cane Hill or Evansville, side by side with Washington and Phoebe Gray and Cassandra's brothers and sisters. The names of brothers and sisters with two exceptions I do not know. Byrd W. Gray was one brother and Amanda was a younger sister, born in 1832.

I have a lovely silver spoon of the 1820 period with the initials C. G. left by Cassandra, and I have pictures of Leonard Schuler and his wife, Cassandra. Leonard, in my opinion, was very handsome and distinguished.

Washington Gray and his son-in-law Leonard Schuler were truly like father and son, for they always lived near each other and were involved jointly in many land transactions in Washington Co., Arkansas. Both had considerable property wherever they lived. (I have many records concerning land but do not feel it is relevant to this history.)

Leonard Schuler was a tanner by trade and was also a surveyor for a period of years in Arkansas. He and Cassandra had six children, five born in Arkansas and one in Mt. Pleasant, Titus Co., Texas. The Schuler children were:

1. Christopher Jeremiah "Nance" Schuler, b. ca 1833 in Cane Hill, Ark., d. March 30, 1907, in Henderson, Rusk Co., Texas, m. Nov. 26, 1868, in Claiborne Parish, La., to Barbara ---- (possibly Bass), b. 1850 Louisiana, d. Jan. 29, 1934, Henderson, Rusk Co., Texas. Christopher served two years in Co. G, 35th Texas Cavalry of the Confederate Army.

2. Washington Gray Schuler, my grandfather, b. July 5, 1837, Cane Hill, Ark., d. July 25, 1900, Dallas, Texas, m. Dec. 23, 1863, in Sulphur Springs, Hopkins Co., Texas, Mary Jane Waits, b. Dec. 4, 1844, in Jefferson, Cass Co., Republic of Texas, d. Dec. 20, 1933, in Dallas, Texas, the dau. of James Cope Waits and Martha Ann Christian Waits. Both are buried in Greenwood Cemetery, Dallas. My grandfather served in Co. D, 11th Texas Infantry, "Roberts' Regulars."

3. Josephine A. Schuler, b. Apr. 1, 1841, Cane Hill, Ark., d. Nov. 4, 1909, Mt. Pleasant, Texas, m. May 29, 1885, Mt. Pleasant, Texas, Jesse Gregory Riddle, b. Dec. 14, 1841, Mt. Pleasant, Texas, d. Jan. 15, 1919, Mt. Pleasant, Texas.

4. Marcellius A. Schuler, b. July 12, 1843, Evansville, Ark., d. Jan. 28, 1878, Mt. Pleasant, Texas, buried in the Edwards Cemetery, Mt. Pleasant, Texas. An Odd Fellows emblem is shown on his tombstone.

5. Mary Louise "Boonie" Schuler, b. May 1, 1845, in Evansville, Ark., d. Mar. 27, 1915, in Mt. Pleasant, Texas, m. Nov. 2, 1868, in Mt. Pleasant, Texas, Emsley Alexander Blount, b. Oct. 1, 1845, Hardin Co., Tenn., d. Feb. 3, 1891, Mt. Pleasant, Texas.

6. Tallyrand or John Tan Schuler, b. Oct. 10, 1856, Mt. Pleasant, Texas, d. June 10, 1913, Mt. Pleasant, Texas, m. ca 1877, Mt. Pleasant, Texas, Mary Fanny Alford, b. Sept. 12, 1854, Georgia, d. Sept. 21, 1910, Mt. Pleasant, Texas. (The name Alford was given by a granddaughter of John Tan. Her maiden name is sometimes shown incorrectly O'Pry.) Both are buried in Damascus Cemetery, Mt. Pleasant, Texas.

About 1847 or 1848 Washington and Phoebe Gray with their daughter Amanda prepared to move from Arkansas to Mt. Pleasant, Texas. By April 1849 Leonard and Gus Schuler were planning to go on the Gold Rush Expedition under the leadership of their friend and neighbor, Captain Lewis Evans. A total of 126 men—90 from Washington Co., 9 from Benton Co., 13 from Madison Co., and 14 from Cherokee Nation—left on Apr. 19, 1849, for the gold fields of California. This particular expedition has been described first by the April 1849 Van Buren (Ark.) Intelligencer and subsequently by

many historical and genealogical magazines. (An ancestor of Will Rogers, Martin Schromsher, was one of the group also, I understand.)

Gus and Leonard returned home to Arkansas in time for Leonard to be enumerated in the 1850 Census of Washington County. At this time Gus, however, decided to go "north" and to go into the cabinet-building business. Possibly he went north only to Missouri. I do not know for certain where he went or to whom he was married. He possibly went to Lewis Co., Mo., where a number of Schulers have been noted. (I am working on this.)

Leonard, according to tradition, came home with \$10,000.00 in gold. This would appear to be borne out by real and personal property shown in the 1860 Titus Co., Texas, Census.

Leonard decided to follow his father-in-law Washington Gray to Mt. Pleasant. (Washington Gray and Phoebe are shown in Titus Co., 1850 Census, alone, both aged 60, both b. S. C. Washington Gray is listed as a physician.)

Early records of Mt. Pleasant show Washington Gray, Byrd W. Gray and John P. Hill signing a petition addressed to the State Legislature requesting a law be passed authorizing the town of Mt. Pleasant to assess and collect taxes. (History of Titus County, Texas, by Richard L. Journey.) From the same source: "One of the oldest institutions in Mt. Pleasant is Temple Lodge No. 70. Mason's Charter granted Jan. 23, 1851. The officers to whom the Charter was granted were: Byrd W. Gray, Worshipful Master, Elam Riddle, Senior Warden, and W. H. Johnson, Junior Warden." Probably Washington Gray was also a Mason. I do not know about Leonard Schuler. Probably he was, too. Certainly my grandfather and father were Masons.

Leonard and family had arrived in Mt. Pleasant at least by the year 1852. First and last Leonard owned about one thousand acres of land in the Mt. Pleasant area.

Thus Washington Gray and Leonard Schuler and family lived near each other once again. In the same vicinity were Amanda Gray Johnson, b. 1832 in Ark., who had married William H. Johnson, b. 1822 in Alabama, an attorney. In the 1850 Census they are shown with a son of one year, Martin.

Byrd W. Gray, first Justice of Mt. Pleasant, was only twenty-five years old in the 1850 Census. He is shown with his wife Rebecca and a young daughter, Mary, less than a year old. They lived nearby.

Whether other Grays living in the Mt. Pleasant area were sons of Washington Gray I do not know. My father, in discussing the Gray relatives years ago, frequently said, "I have many Gray cousins!"

My father, James Burt Schuler, owned a beautiful heirloom type watch. This was left to him by his father, Washington Gray Schuler, in 1900, at the latter's death. The watch had come to Washington Gray Schuler from his "Attorney uncle Gray" who had received it from a grateful client who was unable to pay for legal services in cash. This watch now belongs to my son, Allan Mac Morres. It is still very beautiful and is in perfect running condition. I have seen a watch like it only in the De Young Museum, San Francisco, Calif.

Some time in the late 1850's, William H. Johnson and family left Mt. Pleasant to live in Lamar Co. Washington and Phoebe Gray, the former in failing health, left with them. Washington Gray died of palsy in June 1860, having been ill for two years. Phoebe Gray continued to live with Amanda and William and their sons, Martin, Amos, and Luke. She is so listed in the 1860 and 1870 Census Records. I do not know where my great great grandparents are buried. I would like to know.

Leonard Schuler's family was intact in 1860, all members together. By 1862 Washington Gray Schuler and Christopher also were in the Confederate Army. In 1863 my grandfather had married Mary Jane Waits. In 1868 Mary Louise had married E. A. Blount, and Christopher had married in Louisiana Barbara (Bass?). The Christopher

Schulers lived in Rush Co., Texas, from 1872 until Christopher's death in 1907. I do not know anything about Christopher's descendants, shown in the 1880 Census of Rush Co., Texas, with Lucy E., nine, Leonard, eight, Mary, four, Luke, three, Cassandra, 10 months. A young boy of 14, Sam Bass, lived with them. Was this Barbara Schuler's brother? Was he the Sam Schuler described in Mr. Journey's Notebook?

My grandparents Washington Gray Schuler and Mary Jane, his wife, came to live in Mt. Pleasant about 1869. In May 1869 Leonard Schuler was appointed County Clerk. On May 5, 1870, Leonard Schuler died. Prior to his death he revealed the correct spelling of the surname Schuler and gave detailed family history. Apparently he had never really talked much about the members of his family still in Germany. Cassandra lived on in Mt. Pleasant, living until Jan. 29, 1891. They are buried in the Edwards Cemetery of Mt. Pleasant. With her were her daughter Josephine, who later married Jesse G. Riddle, and the son Marcellius, who died on Jan. 28, 1878, at the age of 34. The Texas Archives strangely enough do not show Leonard's death in the 1870 Mortality Schedule.

After the death of Leonard Schuler, his son, my grandfather, Washington Gray Schuler, was appointed County Clerk to replace his deceased father. It was he in fact who took the 1870 Census in Mt. Pleasant and thereabout.

The Schulers are shown in 1870 as follows:

The Tan Schuler descendants, according to Mr. Journey's Notebook, were: Monte, who married John L. Coker; Guy L., who married Ida Hargrove (lived in Gilmer, Texas); Lily, who married Abner Chapman; Herbert Bennie, who married Mary Frances Chapman; Jessie, who married Boase Williams; and Josie, who married Charlie Rogers. I believe there were four other daughters including Martha L. who perhaps died young. I have very little knowledge of the above. Additional information would be welcome.

The two daughters of Leonard and Cassandra Schuler lived most of their lives in Mt. Pleasant. Josephine became the second wife of Jesse G. Riddle and had no children. Mary Louise Schuler married Emsley A. Blount and had five children, four sons and a daughter. According to the 1880 Census, Titus Co., Clyde was 10, Leonard, 8, Isaac L., 4, Marcellius, 1; Cassandra J. was born March 15, 1887. I believe that Leonard was L. S., Isaac L. was "Link" and Marcellius F. "Buddy."

In a study of the Blount-La Grand murders which took place in Mt. Pleasant in early 1904, I have found it difficult to know "what happened to whom?" The father Emsley A. died as a result of a railroad accident in 1891. On his deathbed he begged his sons not

to "drink" and not to work for the railroad. According to the History of Titus County by Traylor Russell, Leonard Blount lost a leg in a railroad accident and was later shot to death by A. A. La Grand. Clyde P. Blount felt that the shooting of his brother amounted to an ambush and in retaliation shot and killed A. A. La Grand. Clyde P. Blount was indicted for murder but was acquitted.

I have found no clippings or court records to clarify the above. Two items, the subsequent will of Mrs. M. L. Blount in 1915 and the transfer of property in 1904, make me feel that it was not Leonard who was murdered by A. A. La Grand but Link (Isaac L. Blount):

1. On March 31, 1904, several members of the Blount family, all but Link, signed a transfer of property to the law firm of Butler Rolston and J. A. Ward for services in defense of Clyde P. Blount, accused of the murder of A. A. La Grand. Those who signed were: Mrs. M. L. Blount, Cassie, Clyde P., L. S. (Leonard?), and M. F. (Marcellius or "Buddy"). Only Isaac L. (Link) did not sign. Why? I believe that he did not sign because he was the murdered one. Leonard Shuler Blount died June 17, 1918.

2. The will of Mrs. M. L. Blount, signed on Jan. 2, 1915, shortly before she died, said, in part, "a monument to be placed over the graves of my two beloved sons, now deceased: Clyde Blount and Link Blount." Would a mother, any mother, fail to include in her will a monument for the son who was murdered? The sons had been buried in the Masonic Cemetery according to the will. Does anyone know where they are buried?

A Blount grandson was mentioned in Mrs. M. L. Blount's will, Joe Rue Blount. Does anyone know what became of him?

Just recently the son of Cassandra (Cassie) Blount Roberts was buried in Mt. Pleasant. He was James Emsley Roberts who died in Kilgore, Texas, July 12, 1976. I do not know if he left descendants.

My grandparents, Washington Gray Schuler and his wife Mary Jane Waits Schuler lived in Mt. Pleasant until about 1888 when they moved to Dallas. Their three children were:

1. Albert Gray "Ab" Schuler, b. Aug. 25, 1865, in Sulphur Springs, Texas, d. July 28, 1946, in Dallas, Texas, m. ca 1895 Minnie Short, b. Nov. 25, 1871, d. Oct. 2, 1934. They had three sons: Walter Scott, Harry Gladden and Abbie Gray.

2. Robert M. Schuler, b. Oct. 4, 1868, Waco, Texas, d. Feb. 5, 1955, Los Angeles, Calif., m. Feb. 26, 1896, Virginia Rudolph, b. Sept. 18, 1874, McKinney, Texas, d. Feb. 2, 1920, Dallas, Texas. They had two sons and a daughter: Burt, Thad Gray and Dorothy.

3. James Burt Schuler, my father, b. Feb. 4, 1870, in Mt. Pleasant, d. May 7, 1947, in Fresno, Calif., m. June 3, 1903, in Alvord, Wise Co., Texas, Emma Ovella McConnell, b. Aug. 28, 1885, in Batesville, Ark., d. Nov. 2, 1973, in Fresno, Calif. They had a son Robert and two daughters: Elizabeth (the writer of this history) and Margaret.

The study of one's family is both rewarding and frustrating. Many family records were destroyed in a fire in Dallas in 1902. However, my grandmother, who had a remarkable memory, could have told me many things about the family if I had had the sense to listen. Unfortunately I was too busy acquiring a B. A. in history to hear about history first hand.

Any information about the Grays, the Schulers, the Riddles and the Blounts and their descendants will be welcome indeed. How much I am already indebted to Mrs. J. B. Edwards, Mr. Lynn Harper, Mr. Louis Moore, all of Mt. Pleasant, and Judge I. N. Williams of Texarkana. I cannot begin to express my gratitude to all of them.

Friends who have never seen me are the great helpers. They apparently are ever ready and willing. To them I give praise and everlasting gratitude.

IKERSON LOTT - Full Blood Indian

- (1) IKE (IKERSON ?) LOTT was a full blood Indian, believed to have been Cherokee. (Mitchigainea Indians were sometimes found in Arkansas, who came South from Michigan.) He lived in Arkansas. The city may have been Corning, Clay Co., AR. His occupation was horsetrader. He married Sarah KEITH, which was quite a scandale at the time, as she was white. They were married in 18__?. They had children. Sarah had an unruly 16 year old nephew (or at least a relative) living with the LOTTs. She once whipped him for some reason, & he swore he would get even, so he ran away. Sometime later, this same nephew got the measles, which in those days, meant sure death. He told friends "there was one family he wanted to give them to". At this point he returned to the LOTT ranch and asked Sarah for a pack of cigerettes. She could tell he was very sick and asked him to stay outside. She promised to get him the cigerettes, if he would then leave immediately. When she returned he grabbed the pack and her arm, spreading the disease. As a result of this act, the entire family took measles. Everyone died except for one child, Mary Ann LOTT. This happened when Mary Ann was 9 years old. She was born in 1868. So I have dated this incident about 1877. For the deaths of Sarah, and children.

Nancy Ann Keith, married Doc Neadham Harv Grady. Doc was born in Tennessee around 1846. He studied in Stint Louise, and became a woman's doctor (?). To help put him through school, Nancy Ann chopped cotton. Uncle Doc was a great friend to the Lear family. He had Lucian Lear come in to run a cafe in Monette, Craighead Co., AR, and gave them a milk cow. The Gradys had no children. When Doc died Nancy Ann remarried to Gatlin. Aunt Nan had an old Bible with a lot of family records in it. Doc may have had a WILL, leaving something to the Lears, but Gatlin had all his records and papers burned. Gatlin had the mortgage on the Lear farm. He ran the Lears out of the cafe business and took away the milk cow. He wouldn't let the Lears visit with Aunt Nan. (Gatlin burned the Bible, he had two men help him carry arm loads of materials out of the house and they set a big bon-fire.)

Second Generation

2. Mary Ann LOTT (1868-1952) was the daughter of Ike and Sarah Lott. She was born 24 Feb. 1868 at Corning, Clay Co., Ark., and lived most of her life in Butler Co., MO. When she was very young, her family was contaminated with measles. She was the only survivor of this disaster. Her sister died in the bed beside her. She went to live with Sarah Lott's sister, Emily. Aunt Ema was married to William AVERY. The Averys had seven children already, when Mary Ann arrived. Mary Ann was a half breed Indian, and treated almost like a slave in her new home. Although she was about the same age as the other Avery children, she had to stay home, working and scrubbing floors, while the other children went to school. Later to make a living, she took in men's laundry. Because of the way she was treated during her young life, she became a very bitter, hard woman. She married John SCHMIDT (SMITH) about 1885. John called Mary Ann - Molly. They had two children, Lora Louise and Mamie Bell. John SCHMIDT, was born in Indiana (?). Lora was 18 months older than Mamie. Friction in the marriage developed very early. When John could stand no more, he took Lora (then about two years old) from the house, got on his horse said, "Good-bye Molly, I'm leaving you" and rode away with the child in his arms. Mamie was 6 months old at the time. She did not see her sister again for 8 years. Doc Grady was at the divorce proceedings and testified about Molly, "The Devil Himself couldn't get along

with her." John SMITH (SCHMIDT) married (?). They had five sons which were Lora's and Mamie's half brothers. Molly married Will CLIMBER. (Flora Mae is probably a Smith - not a Climber). They had two daughters Flora Mae and Ethel. John Smith went to Black Oak, with Lora to live? Molly later married Jeff Verbal. She died in 1952 at the home of her daughter Laura Millender, 120 North C Street. She was 84 and had been ill for four years. Funeral services were conducted at the Ash Hill Baptist Church, at 3:30 under the direction of White's Funeral Home of Fisk. The Rev. Troy White officiated and burial was in Ash Hill Cemetery, State of Missouri.

Mary Ann Verbal had two brothers; John and Will, who died of measles 1877. At parents death Molly was moved with family possessions to the Avery's at Ash Hill, & Fisk, Butler Co., MO.

3. Lora Louise Smith, born 1887 married Bill Milinder. Lived with her Father, John Smith and her step Mother and five half brothers. Lora had three children:

Molly was 18 or 19 when Lora was born, married 1/2 years. So Molly married John Smith, 31 May 1886.
4. Mamie Bell SMITH (1889-1974) married Lucian Herbert Lear, 11 June 1911. Mamie died 11 June 1974, Sunnymead, Calif. The Lears lived on a 40 acre farm near Monette, Craighead Co., AR. They had seven children:

5. Flora Mae SMITH, was a practicing midwife. On one occasion a father brought her his young daughter, sick with pneumonia. She was in very bad condition and there was little Flora could do for her, but when the child died, the girl's father blamed Flora. He way-laid for her with a shotgun, and as Flora walked to her home, she was murdered. Flora Mae had six husbands: their names were: Cinder; Stone; Hog; Pig; Motley, and Strickland. Flora Mae collected coins.
6. Ethel CLIMER was the fourth daughter of Mary Ann LOTT through the marriage to her second husband, Will CLIMER. She had a son, David, who was killed in WWII.

LUCIAN LEAR'S FAMILY

Lucian Herbert LEAR was the second son of Mammy LEAR. Mammy had 19 children, two died very young, or at birth. Mammy was from Kentucky Mountains, where a snake cult was practiced. (?) A list of the children: Elmore W.; Lucian Herbert Lear, b. 1881/2 died 1936; Albert L.; Edgar G.; Willy J.; Chester R.; Charles Thomas; Harry B.; Paul Wayne; Dewey McK.; Delbert S.; Philip L.; Lockridge; Gerold B.; Elva Grace; Antanette; Oressa; Elsie Marie (came when Dad died). (Mammy) Mary Francis Perry was from Kentucky Mountains.) Lears are buried in Mayfield, Kentucky.

MILLANDER FAMILY

Children of Lora Millander: Sarah Millander was hung in a fence, at a young age and died.

Children of Lora Millander (Con't) John Millander married (?). They had a daughter named Gloria Jean Millander (Millender) lives at 4520 Maple St., North Little Rock, AR ?

Roy C. Millander married Honor (?). His step-daughter's name was Sharlot L. Peterson.

Children of Mamie Bell LEAR (4th Generation): Georgia Mary LEAR, born 1907 and married Rodger Lawrence. They had three children: Carolyn B. Lawrence; Wanza L. Lawrence; & Jerry Wayne Lawrence. Georgia had a house in Cardwell, MO, and her father Lucian Lear, died there and was buried in Cardwell Cemetery. Other plots were also bought at this time.

Zelma Anntonetia Lear, born 1914 and married George Dunning. They had one daughter: Jane Carol Dunning.

Herbert Lucian Lear Jr., born 1917. He and his wife Merle had four children. The 1st died at birth; Janice Elaine Lear; Jerold Richard Lear; and Judy Ann Lear.

Floyd Elmer Lear, 1919-1976.

Johnny Thomas Lear, was born 1921. His wife Dorothy "Dot" had three children. The 1st died in infancy; Sharon Marie Lear; Gary Thomas Lear.

Calvin Sonney Lear, born 1924.

Louise Mae Lear, born 1927. She married Thayne Harwood Young. They had five children: Jennifer Louise Young; Laurie Marie Young; William Gregory Young; Patricia Ann Young; & Todd Harwood Young.

Children of Georgia Lawrence (5th Generation): Carolyn B. Lawrence, married Don L. Therox. Carolyn, born 1930. She had two children: Mike E. Therox, Nov. 1950; & Paula Sue Therox, 21 Oct. 1954.

Wanza L. Lawrence, born 1931, married Charles (?). They had one son: Mark Charles, born 13 Sept. ?. Later Wanza married Richard Voight, they had one son: Kevin Scott Voight, 2 Nov. 1956.

Jerry Wayne Lawrence married Sandra Vickleson. They had four children. 1st died in infancy; Lisa Ann Lawrence; Christopher Jerry Lawrence; Lorene Lee Lawrence; and ?

Children of Zelma Dunning (5th Generation): Jane Carol Dunning, born 1945, married William Thomas Spillman. They had one daughter: Jennifer Michel Spillman.

Following are listings on two small cemeteries that have not been published as far as I know. The first one concerns my Ramick family line, which I am working on now with plans to have a few pages ready later this year for inclusion in "Arkansas Family Historian." Would appreciate hearing from anyone having information on this family, and will gladly exchange information. Also, would like to hear from anyone having any knowledge on the family of Mary An Ramick, who married Charles Spires. John S. Ramick (my great, great grandfather) was listed in 1850 Lexington District, S. C. census but came to Arkansas soon after that; his brother, William David Ramick, was in Jefferson County, Arkansas, by 1850; his sister, Mary An Ramick Spires, was still in Lexington District, S. C. in 1850 but was in Jefferson County, Arkansas, by 1860.

My great, great grandfather John S. Ramick who was buried in Springhill Cemetery as shown below should not be confused with John S. Ramick, his nephew, who was buried in Ramick Cemetery near Grapevine, Arkansas. Both served in the Civil War, and both had a wife named Elizabeth. The older John S. was married a second time after the first wife died, his second wife's name was Martha Morris Clark. She was widow Clark when he married her in 1866. We do not know the date of death of this John S., but it was before the 1880 census, when Martha is shown as head of the house. The younger John S. Ramick married Elizabeth Mayberry Cearley (widow Cearley) after he returned from the Civil War, and they are listed in the 1880 census of Jefferson County, Arkansas.

No dates were shown on the stone in the Springhill Cemetery for my great, great grandfather John S. Ramick, but my great uncle who lives in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, Loyd Ramick, now age 91, told me this was his grandfather and the one buried there. Mr. Roose Ramick of Pine Bluff told me that he had helped place the stone there. According to census records, this John S. Ramick was born about 1826 or 1827.

SPRINGHILL CEMETERY, GRANT COUNTY, ARKANSAS

(This is located in the woods about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile south of Clements Cemetery - Clements Cemetery is about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of Grapevine, Arkansas, off Highway 35). There were a few graves here with no markers, with some having bricks placed for foot stones.)

CEMETERY IN OUACHITA COUNTY, ARKANSAS (Jefferson Township)

I discovered this small cemetery in the woods while deer hunting, and went back to copy the two stones. There appeared to be 20 or 25 sunken graves with no stones. Rocks had been placed at the foot of several. Timber had been cut and some of the brush had to be pulled away from the stones to copy them.

The cemetery is located on a logging road about $\frac{1}{8}$ mile off of a county road from Camden, Arkansas to the community of Troy. (At one time there was a postoffice at Troy) This county road is known as Woodlawn road, first road to the right after passing roadside park on Highway 79 South from Camden. It is 5.9 miles from where you turn off of Highway 79 on the county road before reaching the logging road, and from there is 3 miles on to Troy. This is in Jefferson Township, Ouachita County.

I talked to Mr. Jack Arrington, an elderly man of Troy, who told me that he knew of the cemetery, and that at one time there was a home near there and that it was a family cemetery.

The two stones there were:

"Sacred to the memory of Samuel Johnson, died November 26th, 1853 -
He is not dead, but sleeping"
(Date of birth was not shown)

"William Baker, born 3-16-1814, died 5-21-1890 - Blessed are the pure
in heart, for they shall see God"
(This stone was broken and in three parts stacked up)

John Widekind offers his farm for sale in Pitt Township containing 12 acres. For further information interested parties are advised to inquire of Jacob C. Hoffer, Diamond, Pittsburgh, or the owner.

W.M. Robinson Jr. offers a \$5 reward for the return of his small bay horse which broke out of the stable.

John Hodge offers a \$10 reward for the return of his dark brown mare strayed from his pasture near Steubenville. Mare to be returned either to him or to James C. Henning at Steubenville.

John Darragh of Pittsburgh offers a \$15 reward for the return of a large iron gray horse which strayed the night of July 17th from the farm of Daniel Darragh on Mingo Creek in Washington County, also a sorrel horse. The animals to be returned to John or Daniel Darragh or to John Morton at Mingo Creek.

Thomas Bryan of Plumb Township, Allegheny County, offers a \$5 reward for the return of his sorrel mare which strayed from his farm.

William McCandless Jr. wants the owner of a sorrel mare to come and get his property from the McCandless farm on the headwaters of Robinson's Run, Fayette Township, Allegheny County.

Nathaniel Stewart offers a \$5 reward for the return of his cow which strayed from his property in May 1815. Stewart lives at the sign of the Turk's Head in Pittsburgh on Wood Street.

John Patterson took out a lengthy Page 1 advertisement to say the bad things said about him by John Potter, also known as John W. Ward, were untrue. Z.A. Tannehill, deceased, is mentioned in a character reference given for Patterson by A. Tannehill (brother to Z.A.).

William McPheter wants the owner of a bay mare to come and claim his animal at his farm located in St. Clair Township, Allegheny Township.

David Bruce of Burgettstown has sheep for sale.

Henry Harris has opened a new retail store.

David Logan has a warehouse at the corner of Perry and Water Streets in Pittsburgh.

Thomas Coleman has a candle manufactory in Pittsburgh.

Isaac Harris is selling ginseng and will take dried fruit and flaxseed in exchange. He also sells dry goods and hardware.

Neal & Miltenberger in partnership for copper and tinwares, brass foundry, comb manufactory. George Miltenberger

James Peacock is offering a \$30 reward for the return of two apprentices in his printing business, Peter Keen and Samuel Wier, who ran away on Aug. 10th. Peacock lives at Harrisburgh.

Thomas Pope, architect and bridge builder, has an office on Market Street between Second and Third.

Andrew Humbert & Co. has a copper and tin factory on Wood Street between Second and Third and above Anshutz Rabm & Co. warehouse.

William Rieger & Co. is offering a \$20 reward for two Yankee men who ran away from the tanyard. Description: Frederick Silas, past 25 years, about five feet six inches tall, red complexion, down look and black hair; Charles Trask, past 20 years age, about five feet, three inches tall, rather pale than lively complexion, stout and pretty good looking.

Gormly, W & S Bell wholesale and retail store on the west side of Wood Street between First and Second.

D. Stevenson notifies the public that Sarah Peart (alias Stevenson) has unprovokedly conducted herself in an improper and libidinous manner and he cautions the public not to credit her on his account as he isn't going to pay any debts of her contracting.

J & G Amberson had a clothing and cloth store.

Henry Perry wants to rent to someone an elegant three-story brick house on Wood Street between Fifth and Sixth.

John Wort is offering a six-cent reward for the return of his apprentice Andrew Gilley, about 11 years old, to Wort's boot and shoemaking business. Andrew has dark eyes and complexion.

James Long found on Aug. 22 on Wood Street toward the upper end a long coat with pocket book and various papers. He asks the owner to claim his property at his home on the headwaters of Saw-Mill Run, Pitt Township, Allegheny County.

James Johnston and Johnston & McClelland have a wholesale and retail store on Market Street next door to the Mercury office.

Trotter & Co. is a Pittsburgh pottery. Also mentioned in the advertisement are A. Beelen & Co. and Richard Bowen & Co.

H. Bonnet sells wines at the corner of Front and Ferry Streets.

Chittenden and Parmlee have a new boot and shoe manufactory on Market Street at the Wrenshall and Boggs Store.

Isaac Wickersham sells cloth on Market Street.

James Brown operates a bakehouse on Market Street west of the markethouse and nearly opposite the Sign of the Black Bear.

Doctor H.B. Trout has opened a shop at Middletown in Allegheny County.

James Crossman has a general mercantile store on the west side of Wood Street next door to James Morrison between Second and Third Streets in Pittsburgh.

William Kepner & Co. is a copper and tin warehouse.

Bosler & Co. sell a lot of things, including farming equipment, seeds, foodstuffs.

O'Brien & Dyott have a wholesale and retail druggist business on the west side of the Diamond in Pittsburgh.

John Glass of Philadelphia is establishing a last manufactory (for shoe makers).

John and James Morford are selling patent ploughs at their shop in Penn Street at the corner of Irwin's Alley and nearly opposite William Anderson's.

James Arthurs has a steam fulling mill.

George C. Vallandigham is offering a 180-acre farm for sale in the vicinity of Noblestown in Allegheny County 12 miles from Pittsburgh.

William Lacky has bar iron for sale.

C.H. Orth wants to hire a blacksmith and a few good spinners at the woolen factory at Steubenville.

Rees Jones (recently from Philadelphia) has opened a tobacco manufactory at Pittsburgh on Front Street two doors from the post office.

A. Tennehill is offering a "grove-hill" for sale a half-mile from the center of the Borough of Pittsburgh.

John Vanlee is being sued for divorce by his wife, Jane, in the Pennsylvania Western District Court. William Tilghman is chief justice of the court, W.H. Irish is prosecutor and W.M. Woods sheriff of Allegheny County.

W.M. Friedt is treasurer of the Greensburgh, Pittsburgh Turnpike Road Co.

James Reynolds and James Foster operate a land agency.

Charles L. Volz & Co. have a wholesale store on Wood Street next door to G&C Anshutz.

James Ekin wants to let or lease four lots on Front and Second between Ferry and Liberty Streets.

James Rickey and James Kelly are executors of the estate of John Hanna.

Rachel Douglass and James Espy are administrators of the estate of Thomas Douglass of St. Clair Township in Allegheny County.

Two columns of the paper are devoted to an article and testimonials about the new Louisiana book. About six columns are devoted to articles about Napoleon Bonaparte, his capture, transfer to England and battles, extracts from French newspapers about Bonaparte and articles from other newspapers elsewhere in the country.

This 163-year-old issue of the Pittsburgh Mercury was in extremely good condition when I was allowed to borrow it for part of a day this spring to extract the names. Friday April 26, 1850

A. Virginia JONES, born 18 Nov. 1857 (place unknown). She
married Miles Irwin ODOM, 11 Dec. 1878 in Osceola, Mississippi Co., Ark. He
was a Confederate Veteran and plantation owner who moved there after the
Civil War. They had the following children: Mary Lou (Ocy) ODOM, who was

Irwin ODOM, Jr., b. 1884, and died 1887. Miles Irwin ODOM, Sr., and his

Lodge, F. & M. at one time.

Mary A. Virginia Jones is said to have been disowned by her father when
she married Miles Irwin ODOM because he was a Confederate Veteran and she is
supposed to have had a brother Willie Jones killed in the Union Army.

She had a brother Calvin JONES who lived near them in Mississippi Co.,
Ark. but who moved away about the time that both Miles Irwin ODOM and his
wife died in the spring of 1887. Miles Irwin ODOM died 6 May 1887 and his
wife Mary A. Virginia JONES ODOM died 13 February 1887. The local Masonic
lodge cared for the two surviving children: Mary Lou (Ocy) and Robert B. &
sent them to their people in Newton, Baker Co., GA. Their mother's people
never communicated or had anything to do with them, and they knew nothing of
them except that their grandfather JONES was supposed to have been a Steam-
boat Captain on the river and their grandmother JONES was of French descent
who died and their grandfather remarried. The mother, Mary A. Virginia JONES
could not get along with her stepmother and lived with a family in Osceola at
and prior to her marriage to Miles Irwin ODOM.

Mary A. Virginia JONES is supposed to have had a halfsister who ran off
and married an Indian (the scandal of the family) and moved to Oklahoma. She
is also said to have been related through her mother to a Mr. Quinn or his
wife who lived near them when they lived on the plantation before moving to
town a few weeks prior to her death in 1887.

have seen her first name in various Deeds, they co-signed in Alabama, spell-
ed Tappenes, Taphenas, Taphenis, and Tarphena).

I have just learned that she re-married in Arkansas. I do not know
where she stopped with relatives or located after learning of my great grand-
father's death.

Their children were: John Quincy; Wren; George; Thomas; Sarah married
ABBOTT; Mary Elizabeth married HILL; Alabama married SMITH; and Leanna
Francis (my grandmother) married VINYARD. I doubt if John Quincy ADAMS;
Sarah; Mary Elizabeth and Alabama were with her in Arkansas, as I believe
they married in Alabama.

Is there a central location, indexed by the name of the bride, of marr-
riages which occurred in Arkansas in the 1840-1860 period? I assume she
would have re-married under the name Tarphenus WREN ADAMS rather than Mrs.

ADAMS R. L. Hight, Route 1, Aubrey, TX 76227 - My great grandfather
Benjamin Franklin ADAMS, son of Spencer ADAMS, Sr. and the
son of John ADAMS of Wilkes Co., N. C., Letcher Co., KY., and Dallas Co.,
Ala (in that order) was born in 1804. He came from KY to Ala with his
father and grandfather in 1821. He married Tappenes WREN, where I do not
know, and they had children: John Quincy, Wren, George, Thomas, Sarah (marri-
ed ABBOTT), Mary Elizabeth married 1st Claiborn HILL & 2nd to Ewing DUNN, &
my grandmother, Leanna Francis married George W. VINYARD.

According to family legend, he left Dallas Co., Ala. soon after 1835 as
he sold several parcels of Alabama land at that time, with his family and
travelled to Arkansas (I do not know where, but his Uncle Jesse married
Rhoda MARTIN and died in Searcy Co., AR in 1875 & may have lived there since
the 1830's. My great grandfather left his family in Arkansas and proceeded
to Texas. Before he could send for his family, they learned he had been
ambushed and murdered in Texas. I do not know how this word got back to
Arkansas, but some say his son John Quincy ADAMS came to Texas with him. I
have obtained several copies of land grants by reason of emigration from the
Republic of Texas to Benjamin ADAMS and Benjamin F. ADAMS but cannot defini-
tely identify any of them as belonging to him.

I have been able to trace my line back to my great great grandfather
Spencer ADAMS, Sr.'s marriage to Nancy TOWSON in Rowan Co., N. C. in 1774
but have not been able to obtain any leads concerning my great grandfather's
family in Arkansas or in Texas as to when or where he died and was buried.

My first copy of the Arkansas Family Historian has been received and
I have been busy reading it. I hope thru its media I can find out what
happened to my Arkansas Ancestors in the early 1800's.

"My Ancestors migrated to Arkansas in 1853 and one of the oldest Cemeteries in Sebastain County, Ark., was begun on land belonging to my Great Grandfather, Robert H. McConnell.

Quoting from an article in the Greenwood, Ark., paper of Jan. 19, 1978, by Mr. Horace Bryan "Eneard Gentry, in the 1977 Key Magazine, says that he believes his great grandparents, J. G. and Susan GENTRY are buried at McConnell. John MORROW, born in 1808 is buried there, as are members of the BEAN & MORROW Families, and many who migrated to this area from Tennessee.

For several years access to this Cemetery has been very difficult. When Camp Chaffee, Ark., was built the cemetery was included in the Camp's Grounds. At a later date this area was turned to the Wild Life Game Refuge.

The McConnell Family says the grounds are well tended, but it is a big "hassle" to gain admittance; frequently taking several days and many phone calls to find a ranger with "the keys to the gates" that also has the time to open them.

The 4th week of May this year, I contacted a cousin in Greenwood & ask about a trip to visit and if she would make arrangements for us to visit the cemetery. She tried for 2 days - calling many numbers, with no success. Our round trip of 1000 miles was enjoyable in seeing Family, etc., also, was sad & frustrating to not be able to visit one of the oldest Cemeteries in Sebastain County, Arkansas.

Has this Cemetery been inventoried for the historical genealogical information? To whom would an interested person correspond to make access to the "McConnell Cemetery" more readily available for interested persons? Following is the article 'Round These Hills, by Horace Bryan.

GENTRY-MORROW-McCONNELL CONNECTIONS

In the 1860 census, a person named as John Bartly McConnelly was living in the J. G. Gentry family home. The post office was Back Bone, Center Township, Sebastain County.

Was this man's name McConnell? The Gentry family of Gentry Cut and the Morrrows, who long lived as their nearest neighbors, are known to have been related. We know the Morrrows arrived here in 1852. The Gentrys arrived about the same time, if not with them. Both came from Tennessee, where they were among the earliest settlers. Evidence indicated that Robert McConnell arrived here about the same time. He was from Blount County, Tenn., but came here directly from eastern Arkansas and may have been in Mississippi before that.

Anyway, there is a well established tradition that Hazzard Been and Nathaniel D. Osborn had known Bob McConnell before they settled here. The Beens and Osborns were from Mississippi but Hazzard Been and Jane Been, the wife of Nat. D. Osborn, were born in Tenn. They seemed to have a short stop in eastern Arkansas and may have met, or rejoined, Bob McConnell there. Bob McConnell came to Sebastain County first and the Beens and Osborns followed some time later. Hazzard Been's old bible documents, the sale of his Mississippi lands on December 14, 1852 and the birth of a child near Greenwood on June 13, 1854. Another thing, a Morrow woman married into an old French family at Arkansas Post in 1851. So the trails of these families did cross, perhaps more than once, before they settled here.

Eneard Gentry, in the 1977 Key Magazine, says that he believes that his great grandparents, J. G. and Susan Gentry, are buried at McConnell. John Morrow, born in 1808, is buried at McConnell. Nearby lived his daughter, Louisa, and her husband, James H. McConnell, the last living Confederate veteran in Sebastain County. Bounty land grants for the Florida (Seminole) War shows this to be John Morrow, Jr. The same government records show that Joh Morrow, Sr., a crippled veteran of the War of 1812, arrived in Sebastain County from Tennessee in 1852. The Commissioner of Pensions recorded that John Morrow, Sr., and also his widow, were dead in 1857. Is this old soldier also buried at McConnell cemetery?

Eneard Gentry, in the Key Magazine, documents the early settlement of the Gentrys and Morrrows in the old Wautauga settlement, the first white settlement in Tennessee. The Gentrys and Morrrows, he notes, lived in the same settlements founded by William Bean in 1769. The first white child

same settlements, belonged to the same churches, witnessed land deeds and Wills, for each other as the white settlements spread. A David Gentry married Tiana Rogers, moved to Arkansas to join the Cherokees living here David was killed in the Cherokee war with the Osage and Tiana became the wife of Sam Houston shortly after the Arkansas Cherokees were moved to Indian Territory in 1828-29.

Wautauga settlement was founded by William Bean in 1769. The first white child born in Tennessee was his son, Russel Bean, named for his mother's people. She was Lydia Russel, the only branch of that family I have found that spelled it with one l. Russel Bean was a famous character in early Tennessee history and the Beans of Tennessee became a numerous clan. They scattered all over the South and Southwest and Russel or Russell was a common given name among them. The name is sometimes spelled Beane, more often Beene, and rarely Been. But Been appears in Revolutionary War records in both Tennessee and Kentucky.

Russel Bean had a sister, Jane Bean, who was killed in the last Indian raid, in 1794. Jane Been Osborn, out in Liberty cemetery, has a son beside her, Russel Osborn. I do not believe that spelling, with one l is coincidental. She, too, had a half-brother named Russel Been.

Nearly all the early east Tennessee settlers intermarried with the Cherokees, with whom they had very friendly relations. It is amazing how many of these Cherokee related families came on to Western Arkansas. Sometime I would like to deal in detail about our Indian Heritage. But back to McConnell cemetery.

I have long felt that McConnell cemetery was perhaps older than Liberty cemetery. That probably goes back to something old Uncle Jim (James H) McConnell told me around 45 or 46 years ago. There is an impressive stonewall plot there in which is buried Samuel and Martha Allison and several of their children with stones dating back to 1851. Outside are several stones of a Slusser family. In Hayes' Atlas of Sebastain County, published in 1887, found Martha Allison holding a broad spread of land which included McConnell cemetery. Allison land was on the North and East by those of Robert McConnell. The east border was near present Highway 96, north of the strip pits, bordered by the large holdings of J. S. Striplin on the prairie. Allison lands stretch westward just beyond the Biswell mountain road north of the old John Hall place. This and the Jason Williams place, was on top of the first hill in Camp Chaffee beyond the end of Bell road. From there Allison land went north to the top of the first hill south of the old iron bridge across Vache Grasse. I had, before I saw the Atlas, asked both Earl and Arl McConnell if they knew, anything about the Allisons. Both said no but Arl recalled that the hill South of the iron bridge was once called Allison hill. Right he was, I guess.

The Atlas showed only two houses along the old road there. The one which was at the top of the hill, when I was young, had evidently not yet been built. Back then there was a black family occupying an ancient log cabin about a hundred yards south. In this family was an aged greyhaired singer and banjo picker. Buggies, wagons and horseback riders blocked that road on Sunday afternoons to hear this oldtimer perform. He would set on the front porch with his faded derby at his feet. The crowd kept him going by pitching pennies, nickles, dimes in the hat.

Further south on down, perhaps 300 yards was a frame house Negroes lived there too, when I first remember. Later the log cabin disappeared along with the blacks, and whites lived in the frame house in 1884.

Grandfather Ben Townley probably rented it from the Allisons.

There are, of course, many unmarked graves in McConnell cemetery. Nobody knows whose graves they mark, or how old they are. Maybe the first of the Gentrys, the first of the Morrrows, and other pioneers. Nobody but the McConnells and their kin seems to have used the cemetery now for about 75 years. Besides, John Morrow, Jr., these include the Lusters, Bertha Luster being the wife of Bob McConnell, Jr.; Sam Brown whose wife was a daughter of James H. McConnell; Tinsley Joyce, ditto; and Nat. H. Osborn, son of Nathaniel D. and Jane BeenOsborn, who married Mary Jones McConnell, daughter of old Robert "Aunt Maje" Osborn, as she is remembered by later generations, was a colorful character whose adventures before she reached maturity would fill a book.

PASCOE learned of a lady who searches the 1880 and 1900 censuses
for one's ancestors and I asked her to look for the fam-
ily of my Grandmother, Mary Frances McCARVER PASCOE. I had very little
information to give her but gave her every scrap I had. And to my great
joy she located my grandmother in the family of her parents in the 1880
census, so at last I know the names of her parents. In my Query in the
March issue (AFH) I did not know their names, only that Mary Frances
McCarver was in Searcy Co., Ark., at the time that she first married to
Mr. R. W. GUINN at age 16. They were both of Snowball.

This is what I learned from the 1880 Census: My great grandparents.
McCARVER were located in Richland Township, Searcy Co., AR. Mary Frances'
father was James M. McCARVER, age 25, born in Miss., a farmer. His wife
was Nancy COSLEN?, age 23, b. in AR. Mary Frances (my grandmother) was 2
years old and had a baby brother 4 months old, who was named James M. after
his father.

Living in the same household, was the mother-in-law of James M.
McCARVER, Mary A. COSLEN, age 59, b. in AR. She was a widow.

Also living in the same household, was a brother-in-law of James
McCARVER, Joseph H. COSLEN, age 21, b. in AR, and his young wife, Susan,
age 17, b. in TN, and their baby son, James H. COSLEN, age 4 months.

This information could be so helpful if only one descendant of any
one of these people might happen to see it and would respond. I was so
thrilled to get this and learn not only who my great grandparents were but
probably the name of great grandmother's parents, COSLEN.

After receiving the 1880 Census report, I wrote back for a search of
the 1900 and this same family was located in Breckenridge Township, Jackson
Co., AR. Of course Mary Frances was married and not living in the home of
her parents. However, we were unable to locate Mary Frances in the house-
hold of any BURCH, the name we believed here to have in 1900 as he name
was Mary Frances BURCH, at the time she married Grandfather James Henry
PASCOE in 1901. At this time I do not know where she was in 1900.

But the household of James M. McCARVER, included his wife, Nancy and
these children: James M., age about 20, as he was an infant in 1880, and
John A., age 16, Flavous J. (?) age 13, Vadie age 12, Plato, age 9, Maggie
age 7. I would love to correspond with any of the descendants of these
