

No time for anything, except...send information letters to those inquiring about our Society, and where they might purchase...most anything...already in print about GENEALOGY...and many other questions (and not enough time to mention all that).

REMEMBER in the DECEMBER 1981 issue the notice to pay your membership before January!! THAT IS FOR A GOOD MANY REASONS...First of all, how can anyone guess how many members we may have in 1982? The newspapers, TV etc all tell us how many people are out of work, and with paper, and other supplies so high and continuing to go higher, the smart thing to do is to watch our expenses and not print so many extra anything as there is no storage space! Type it as you would like to see it in print, with a good clear type on regular size paper (or 14 inch paper if you like) so it might be photo-copied (and not retyped. At the end you might mention the part you would like to locate more information about. Good documented (where you received your information, page and book number, the source, whether from a personal interview, newspaper, tombstone inscription, bible record, etc.) is very good.

BIBLE RECORDS and CEMETERY RECORDS are being received very nicely...and many of the County Extension Homemakers Council Chapters are working very hard to get their cemetery records indexed and ready to publish. If you are interested in any of these county records do not wait even a few days to order (after you find they have been published). Most are not publishing over 200 (some not that many) to much money is involved, and they just know they will never sell over 10. This is an opportunity for all of the friends of family history in California to become better acquainted with researching in Arkansas.

You might like to join either a Historical or Genealogical Society in the County where your ancestors settled. Not all Counties in Arkansas have a Society, but if you would like to know the name and address of those in Arkansas...you might drop a request to our office. We cannot send the names of all the Societies in Arkansas, but will give the name & address, if you will mention the name of the town (and be sure to send S.A.S.E.) Or if you have the December issue for 1981, a complete list of the known Societies in Arkansas are listed.

At present our ARKANSAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, INC. exchanges with 110 Societies all over the U.S.A. and Canada. This means we send our four quarterlies to 110 different Societies, and they in turn send their publications to us. When all for the year have arrived, they are then bound and placed with our other large collection of Gift Books, books our Society has purchased, etc. in the Little Rock Public Library, 8th and Louisiana (one block west of Main Street in downtown Little Rock) hours 9 to 4 each day except Sunday and Monday. This is on the 2nd floor. (Closed on Holidays)

The Arkansas History Commission Office, is located directly back of our present day Capitol Building (Number One Capitol Mall) 2nd floor. Hours are 8:30 to 4:00 each day except Sunday and Holidays. This is where the newspapers, census, manuscripts, etc are located.

The Library at University of Arkansas Medical Sciences has a beautiful new building and a large collection of material about many medical subjects, comfortable surroundings, small study rooms, you will really need to see all the building to appreciate what our Arkansas Medical Center looks like today. The Library at The University of Arkansas at Little Rock is also a great place to research, 33rd and University Avenue, Little Rock, Arkansas.

If you cannot do you own research, you might request a list of people who research for a fee. Please enclose S.A.S.E. You make your own contact.

Many new books are being added to our SOURCE MATERIAL of INTEREST to those interested in Arkansas. Census, marriage records, family histories, etc. Published by both Arkansas people and those interested in Arkansas People and History. BRISCO OF CROFTON HALL
CUMBERLAND COUNTY
ENGLAND

The founder of this family came into England with William the Conqueror, bringing with him a body of free lances from Brisqua in Suabia, from which principally the family derives its name. *The Briscoes of Crofton Hall, Cumberland, are a junior branch of this ancient family all of whom spring from Brisco of Suabia. This younger line descends from Isold Briscoe, the younger son of Robert the fourth in descent from the first Lord Robert.

- (1) Robert had a son -
- (2) Alan, who had a son -
- (3) Gordon, who had a son -
- (4) Robert, who married Matilda, who released her dowry of feiffment to John, her oldest son in 1313.
Issue 1 John, 2 Isold.
- (5) Isold of the Manor of Crofton married Margaret Crofton, by this marriage acquired the manors of Crofton, Whinhow and Dundraw. Margaret Crofton was daughter and heir of Sir John Crofton who married Margaret Whinhow, daughter and heir of Sir Gilbert Whinhow.
- (6) Christopher of Crofton, le pt 14 soldiers at Brisco, Thornupon-Eske. He was taken prisoner at the burning of Wigton and had to mortgage his lands.
- (7) Robert married Isabel Dykes, daughter of William Dykes of Warthole. Issue-
 1. Thomas, became a priest.
 2. Robert, succeeded his father.
 3. Isold, who fought against the Saracens, died a hermit.
 4. Edward, from whom descended the families of Westward, Aldenham, and Hertfordshire.
 5. Alexander, from whom descended the Briscoes of Yarwell, Northhanptionshire.
 6. Syth, who became the wife of Richard Brown.
 7. Susan, who married Robert Ellis of Bethill.
- (8) Robert, married Catherine Skelton, daughter of Clement Skelton of Petrel-Wray.
- (9) John, married Janette, daughter of Thomas Salkeld of Cerby.
- (10) Richard of Crofton, married Elizabeth Leigh, daughter of John Leigh of Frisengton, a descendant of "Ye Leigh of Isell and Lord of the same".
 1. Robert, slain at the Battle of Saltoun (Selway) Mess 1542, in reward for whose services King Henry VIII remitted the Wardship of his infant son for the benefit of the widow and said infant son John who married and had issue
 2. Leonard, became ancestor of the American family.
- (11) Leonsrd, married and had issue-
 1. Robert
 2. William
 3. John, (who came to Maryland)
 4. Leonard

*The surname was in England, originally de Birkskough
The latter was the name of the family seat near Biggin, Cumberland

Swabia or Sualia in Alsace Lorraine part of Germany

- (12) Dr. John Briscoe, born 1590 came to Maryland on the personal invitation of Lord Baltimore. The letter still in possession of the Briscoe family is dated "Oldham, Sept. 1, 1633 and addressed to Dr. John Briscoe, Brikaheagh, New Biggin, Cumberland County, England"...

"Dr. John Briscoe, Greeting:

Dear Sir-As the Privy Council have decided that I shall not be disturbed or dispossessed of the Charter granted by His Majesty, the "Ark" and pinnace "Dove" will sail from Gravesend about the first of October, and if you are of the same mind as when I conversed with you, I would be glad to have you join the Colony. With high esteem,
Your most ob't servant, Cecilius Baltimore."

Dr. John Briscoe mentioned as one of the "twenty settlement of very good fashion" who came to Maryland with Leonard Calvert settled in St. Mary's County with the other adventures. He married in England, Elizabeth DuBois of the Huguenot family of the Count duRussey, Marquise du Bois whose descendents fled to England for protection. Dr. John Briscoe and his wife both died in St Mary's County, Maryland.

Edward's descendents went south to ARKANSAS, KENTUCKY, OKLAHOMA, TEXAS, MISSOURI, MISSISSIPPI, etc.

Close neighbors and friends of 3 Brisco families in Arkansas

John High was born in Germany in 1771 and came to America at age 19. He first went to Mound Township Warren County, Indiana and in 1838 came to Rogers ARK as a blacksmith. His family was large and consisted of 8 boys and 4 girls. He built a grist mill on Prairie Creek close to White River and Lorenzo Dow High, one of the oldest sons moved to 5 miles north of Berryville before the Civil War and started a small store, the place was named High, Ark.

Before Dow High came to Carroll County, Ark., he married to a 4th cousin Elizabeth Crabaugh. Some of the Crabaughs (also originally from Germany) star-ed the settlement of War Eagle 8 miles east of Rogers, Arkansas and later came to Carroll County. During the Gold Rush in California, Dow and his brother bought a large herd of over 500 cattle to drive to California. Spencer Blalock, Isaac Standlee, John Bates, Tom Yeary, George Gardenshire, Frank Layman and J. M. Hanby were some of the men who went with them. They sold the cattle after the long drive and were paid in 20 dollar gold pieces.

The men rode a boat back to New Orleans and some then went up to St. Louis, MO, bought 2 horses and carried the gold back to High, Arkansas. Some of the men stayed in California and struck it rich, and a few came back to Arkansas with their gold.

Dow buried his gold in a secret place and when the guerillas and bush whackers got bad in the Civil War he sent his family to Missouri, near Springfield. Bushwhackers had heard about the buried gold and some of them shot Dow High and he died on the spot.

After his wife came back from Missouri, they sought her out and blistered her legs badly with firebrands trying to get the secret of buried gold from her. Family tradition has it that the gold was never dug up! Elizabeth the daughter married Edgar Cole later. their daughter Polly married another Cole.

The Crabaughs grew up with the Brisco families. Later when Glen's parents moved to California they were to move near the Martin Briscoe family in the Chino?-Pomona area! Leonard Brisco now of Berryville lived in this area for awhile as a child but the family moved back to Arkansas.

BRISCO FAMILY REVIEW

Joseph Brisco and his wife Jane (Ford) came from Alabama in the late 1800's and one of the 7 sons, Martin T. Brisco was born in Farmington (Washington Co., Arkansas) several of Martin's children, 10 in all, were born in Berryville, Carroll County, Arkansas.

James Orley Brisco, 1-7-1916 was one.

Lulu, Lester, Hazel & Daisy (twins) Nettie, Henry, James and Willis in order of birth. Martin farmed and his wandering took him to White River, Missouri where Henry was born and to Golden, MO., where Willis was born. Later the family moved to McAlester, Oklahoma City, and Indianola, Oklahoma and also Little Rock, Arkansas. In later years he moved his family to Pomona, Calif. for the twin's health as the family doctor suggested.

Of the other 6 sons, Solomon married Cora McDonald and settled down on a farm 7 miles north of Berryville, Arkansas.

Leonard and Lena (twins) born around 1910 are still in the area. He married Ethel Smith and she married Joe Stacy.

Josephine (Long) a sister died Dec 1979 in Casville, MO.

Sol, George, Henry and Martin's families grew up together in Carroll County. Glenn Crabaugh, 6788, Ballinger Ave., San Diego, CA 92119 has the Brisco listed in the Arkansas state census of 1830 and 1840 and will answer questions for an S.A.S.E. enclosure.

Mrs. Eileen Harvey of 502 McKennon St., Berryville, AR 72616 is a great granddaughter of M. T. and America who had Mary Frances, her son James Blaine Chafen and his daughter, Alice Kilgore, all of Arkansas. M. T. and family lived at Clarksville, Johnson County, Arkansas for awhile. A great many families of Brisco have lived in Arkansas and nearby Missouri.

We hope this will be of help in searching the Brisco surname, as until just recently there was no Brisco surname in the Salt Lake City Archives.

My husband, James Orley says his grandfather was a trader and wilderness guide taking men bear hunting. Family tradition has it that Joseph found a mine of lead but died without telling anyone about it! He'd go away several days in Newton Co. and come back with newly made lead bullets for his guns!

THE BRISCOE FAMILIES OF WASHINGTON AND CARROL COUNTIES, ARKANSAS

William Henry Briscoe came to Arkansas, from Alabama and he had four brothers who went to Carroll County, Arkansas. They were, James Winfield, Solomon Grover, Matthew Richard, Jacob Franklin. The old Census is hard to read. I think James Winfield was the father of George and Sol Briscoe, of Carroll County, Arkansas.

William Henry Briscoe, lived in West Fork, Washington Co., AR., and he and his 1st wife had six children: Ruth, Hazel, Pacey, Leonard, Newton, Richard. After his 1st wife died he married 2nd Sarah Crannell, and they had: Allen, Buster, Lena, Josephine, and Grover Cleveland (Shorty).

Grover married Elizabeth Moke and they had five children: Bessie, William, Elmer, Ruth, and James S.

BRISCOE FAMILIES OF CARROLL COUNTY, ARKANSAS

George Washington Briscoe married Adaline Erwin, and they had seven children:

Hopefully, I will be able to establish the names of his parents. Joseph WIGLEY, b. 18 Feb. 1846 married 1863 to Elizabeth H. FRASER, had one son Henry Hamilton WIGLEY, b. 31 July 1868. All these people were born in Hall Co., GA. Joseph fought in the Civil War on the Union side and was considered a traitor here, so he moved his family to Arkansas. I have a death record of Henry Hamilton WIGLEY that states that he and his parents were born in Arkansas. I have proof that Joseph & Elizabeth were born in GA., but Henry H. WIGLEY could have been born in Arkansas. I have not been able to locate a birth certificate for him however.

Joseph WIGLEY was killed by a tornado uprooting a tree which fell on him 8 March 1877. He was buried the same day. He lived in Crawfordsville, Crittenden Co., AR., and was buried there. I have two affidavits that were signed by Joseph Nance & Solmon Mann, dated 29 Apr. 1891, stating that they were neighbors and helped bury Joseph WIGLEY on 8 March 1877. HOME GUARD OF MINUTE MEN
 OF
 POPE COUNTY, ARKANSAS
 1861

Edited by James Logan Morgan

After Arkansas seceded from the Union, the secession con-
 vention continued to meet to provide a sound legal structure
 for the state. An ordinance passed by the convention on May
 30, 1861, authorized the county courts in each county to
 appoint "a home guard of minute men" for terms of service of
 three months, with at least ten men in service in each township.
 The duties of the home guards were "to see that all slaves are
 disarmed, to prevent the assemblage of slaves in unusual num-
 bers, to keep the slave population in proper subjection, and to
 see that peace and order are observed."

On July 28, 1861, the county court of Pope County,
 Arkansas, appointed companies of "Home Guards or Minute Men"
 to serve for three months in each of the townships. The mem-
 bers of each company were ordered to meet in the regular
 polling place of their township on August 3, 1861, to organize
 and elect officers. Reports on the elections were made at a
 special meeting of the county court on August 5, 1861.

YORK CEMETERY - Lewisville, LaFayette County, Ark.

These few inscriptions were found on stones in an old abandoned cemetery near Lewisville, county seat of LaFayette County. The area is rapidly reverting to the natural state and within a few years, unless some precautions are taken, it will be completely lost. The timber has been cut, at least once, by the money-grubbers, and timber brush, briars, vines, and saplings obscure the site unless a knowledgeable person points the way. At one time it was fenced with wire, but the fence is down and rusting away. One grave is fenced but fence and gravestone are covered with vines and bushes.

The site is found by taking Highway 29 North from Lewisville Courthouse, traveling about 3/4 mile and turning right onto the Sanitary Landfill sign. The cemetery is on left hand side of road just before reaching landfill. Residents in area will be glad to point out location.

OLD OAK GROVE (or PATTERSON) Cemetery

This old cemetery is located near Oak Grove Church building, several miles below Stamps, LaFayette County. You must travel south from the crossroads at the Church building about 2 miles and then go thru a wooded area to reach the site. At one time (about 10 years ago) it was possible to drive part way down a small lane almost to the cemetery. There may be still another direction --if you ask local residents.

It has been many years since a burial in this cemetery, but it is still in fair condition. There must be local people who care. There are large oak trees nearby from which it undoubtedly received its name. The site is not indicated on the LaFayette County highway map, but will be well-known by those who live in the area.

Dear Mrs. Cia:

I am the fellow who called you when I was in Little Rock on April 6 wishing to place a query in the next issue of the publication of the ARKANSAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY. It concerns one NAOMI NEWTON and LARKIN NEWTON who appear in the 1830 census for Washington Co., Ark. Larkin Newton was the brother of my great great grandfather, John Newton. I believe that Naomi Newton was the mother of John and Larkin Newton, both of whom were born in South Carolina. I cannot prove that Naomi is this mother, but a great deal of circumstantial evidence says that this relationship is so. Hence, I seek additional information in the interest of this case.

The essential information is as follows:

1. The above JOHN NEWTON was born in 1790 in S.C.; his brother, LARKIN, was born in 1794 in S.C. There was a third brother, BASIL, who some say was born in Tennessee about 1800, but I believe was born about 1798 in S.C..
2. JOHN NEWTON married Jane Blair in 1813 in Rutherford Co., Tn. One son, Elbert C., was born in 1814 in Tn.. Four other children: Telitha, Betsy, Charles & Asa Richardson - were born in Arkansas. Asa Richardson Newton is my great grandfather; he was born in 1822 in Pulaski Co., Ark.
3. JOHN AND JANE NEWTON moved from Tn. to Arkansas in 1815. This move was in the company of JANE (BLAIR) NEWTON's parents, THOMAS and SARAH (CARNAHAN) BLAIR. The move was made by river boat and is recorded in a letter written by son ELBERT C. NETWON in 1884 while visiting in Dover, Arkansas, from his memoirs. This chronicle was used by Myra Mc Almont Vaughn in an unpublished history, a copy of which can be found in the files of the ARKANSAS GAZETTE, Margaret Ross, historian. An abstract of this record is attached for you.
4. JOHN AND JANE (BLAIR) NEWTON both died within days of one another late in 1822, probably of some epidemic, leaving a will (copy attached) and four small orphans. One son, Charles, had died as an infant before 1822. JOHN NEWTON's brothers, LARKIN and BASIL, were to take care of these children.
5. LARKIN NEWTON and the children of JOHN and JANE NEWTON moved first to Crawford Co.; then to Washington Co.. Here he married MARY ANN WILSON, daughter of JOHN WILSON in 1829, LARKIN NEWTON was first county clerk of Washington Co. and first postmaster of Fayetteville; he also held other offices and ran a grist mill. It was here in 1830 that NAOMI (sp. "NAOMA") NEWTON joins LARKIN NEWTON on the census list, apparently living next door. In the household of Larkin Newton the oldest child, Elbert C., of deceased brother JOHN, lives. The three other orphan children: Telitha, Betsy and Asa R. are in the household of NAOMI NEWTON.
6. JOHN NEWTON's other brother, BASIL, remained in Crawford Co.; married a sister of one JAMES EDMONDSON; raised a family of four children; and apparently died there about 1845.
7. LARKIN NEWTON, NAOMI NEWTON and the children of JOHN and JANE (Blair) NEWTON, as well as THOMAS and SARAH (CARNAHAN) BLAIR all moved up into Newton Co., Mo. in 1833 or 1834. So, they were not in Washington Co., Ark. very long. Newton Co., Mo. is named for one Sgt. JOHN NEWTON, a Revolutionary War soldier who fought in the Battle of Charleston, S.C. in 1780 and maybe also in 1776. LARKIN NEWTON became a county judge of Newton Co., Mo. in 1839. NAOMI NEWTON died some time after 1840 in Newton Co., Mo., and before 1847 when my NEWTONS moved once again, this time to Ellis Co., Texas.

8. Back in South Carolina in Newberry Co. and Edgefield Co. where lived this Sgt. John Newton from about 1772 until his death in 1799. He was married twice: (1) to MARY MITCHELL and (2) to NAOMI ??? (maybe also Mitchell). He married his second wife about 1789. When he died in 1799 his second wife, NAOMI, was the administratrix of his estate; he died without any will. Wife NAOMI NEWTON settles the estate by 1801 and then seems to disappear from records in S.C. No record is found of her in Tennessee, although there are records of the service in the War of 1812 for both JOHN NEWTON (d. 1822 in Ark.) and LARKIN NEWTON (d. 1858 in Texas). Then there is the move in 1815 from Tennessee to Arkansas, but in the account there is no mention of NAOMI NEWTON.

With the above background it is my belief that NAOMI NEWTON, second wife of Sgt. JOHN NEWTON of S.C., is the same as the NAOMI NEWTON who appears in the 1830 census of Washington Co., Ark.. Hence, she would be the mother of my great great grandfather, JOHN NEWTON who died in 1822 in Pulaski Co., Ark.. NAOMI (???) NEWTON of S.C. was born about 1755; NAOMI NEWTON of Washington Co., Ark. in 1830 was between 70 and 80 years old. Hence, on the basis of age these two could be one and the same.

Now as to a query: I want to know any information about my Newtons that may exist in Arkansas sources.

WANTED: Information about NAOMI NEWTON or LARKIN NEWTON who were in Washington Co., Ark. in 1830. Larkin Newton was brother of JOHN NEWTON who died in Pulaski Co., Ark. in 1822; John Newton and Larkin Newton were born in South Carolina about 1790 - 1794.

Need proof that NAOMI NEWTON above is related to LARKIN and JOHN NEWTON. Further background in Arkansas, Tennessee or South Carolina is sought.

These Newtons are not to be confused with Thomas Willoughby Newton of Arkansas and Virginia of the same period.

Extract from an unpublished manuscript by Myra McAlmont Vaughn. Source (1980): Heiskell Library of the Arkansas Gazette, Mrs. Margaret Ross.

In this manuscript, Mrs. Vaughn was writing from several original sources and, in part, quoting from a letter by Elbert C. Newton to John Robert Homer Scott written at Dover, Arkansas in 1884. He was apparently visiting there at the time. By that time Elbert C. was married to the widow of Finis E. King and, I suppose, the both of them were visiting old friends in Arkansas. In the following I have extracted only those portions of the Vaughn manuscript that relate to the letter of Elbert C. Newton; direct quotes are underlined.

"J. R. Pyeatt of Cane Hill, Rev. J. Blair of California he wrote to for information, the latter he lost his memoranda and was uncertain about dates. - But Mr. Blair thinks 1814 and Mr. Newton thinks 1813, James and Jacob Pyeatt, John and James Billingsley and families, and Rev. John Carnahan, a C. Presbyterian preacher and William Blair (brother of the Rev. J. Blair of California), left Alabama, where they were living, as the place was required for the Indians, and emigrated to Arkansas, stopping at the Post - then a settled place, and remained there one year, making a crop. It was a very sickly season and they moved up the river the next year. The Pyeatts stopped on the north side of the river, 12 miles above Little Rock; the Billingsleys went

up to Cadron where there was a small settlement; James Billingsley was, he thinks, the first member of the Legislature from Crawford County, was one of the early settlers of Washington Co. and later moved to Texas, where he died in Johnson Co. about 1860, about 80 years of age. He was the father of John Billingsley, the state senator from Washington Co. and yet living (1884), about 81 years old. In 1815, Thomas Blair with his wife and family of 6 sons and 2 sons-in-law of whom John Newton, father of the writer was one, emigrated from Tennessee to Arkansas. They came in a homemade boat, made and launched in the river 5 miles above Nashville. "At the same time my father, mother and family of 2 sons and 2 daughters and 2 sons-in-law, and another family occupied an old keel boat and this composed the fleet. Some of the men went by land bringing all their horses. The boats made the trip safely. They went up the White River to the cutoff and through that to the Arkansas. At the Post there were some settlements, the next at Pine Bluff, then to Little Rock, no house there except one round log house just below Little Rock unoccupied. A Mr. Wright Daniel was living on the north side of the river. "Thinks his widow married Jacob Pyeatt, after he became a widower, about 1821.

The Tennessee emigrants - being related to and acquaintances of the ones who had gone to Cadron, went there to the Billingsleys and staid till 1816, but having much sickness all went to Mulberry (Little & Big) where Jesse Bean and others were living.

Jesse Bean was the father of Mark Bean, some years a state senator. "With him I became early and intimately acquainted and will here say that he was one of Arkansas's most noble men, and died at his home on Cane Hill in the winter of 1861 or '62 full of honor as he was of years."

In 1818, he thinks it was, the settlers on the north side of the Arkansas were required to remove for the Cherokees to whom the land had been ceded. Major Bradford, commander at Ft. Smith, gave the people permission to settle on the south side and some did so, others moved down the river. Mr. Newton and the Blair connections went down the river and stopped on the McHenry farm above Crystal Hill, but being very sick and some 2 or 3 deaths, his father soved out from the river and settled on the road from Little Rock, up the river on the north side. His house was 8 miles from Little Rock and up to the time of his death - it was the first house on the road above town. "Grandfather Blair was living nearby, having left the river to hunt health." His mother, Mrs. Newton, died a few days before his father and grandmother Blair a few weeks preceding. They abandoned their homes after these deaths mentioned before. He continues - "Those remaining up the river were sick a good deal but did not suffer as those down the river."

In 1823 - 1828 he says he was at old Crawford Court House and there the society was different from what he had seen - "Much drinking and fist fighting, but not serious, people were honest, quiet and peaceful when there was no whiskey on board. During those five years neither murder nor horse theft in the country. Two young men, John P. Houston brother of the noted statesman, and James Lucas, who was afterwards the wealthy man of St. Louis, located at Crawford Court House and starved out and I there saw a goodly number of the prominent men of early days, but nothing special to note here."

He saw when the Washington Co. country was opened, more than half the south side settlers left their homes and sold and went north in quest of health, and were not disappointed in that respect. He thinks Fayetteville was located in 1829. He lived with his uncle, Larkin Newton, 3 or 4 years, first clerk of Fayetteville. Then he saw for the first time prisoners in custody for high crimes, and there were pistols and knives and in-fighting.

"Rev. John Carnahan, referred to, probably preached the first sermon in the Arkansas Valley in 1814 - or '15, Rev. John Harris the first circuit rider in 1818, Rev. Wm. Stennton (sp ?) first presiding elder at first camp meeting in Crawford Co. in 1823, also a union meeting."

He closes his letter thus:

"As you rather insisted on my being somewhat personal in regard to my own history, I will say this much. Being only 8 years old when left an orphan boy, I never forget the example and precepts of my loved parents and although placed and surrounded with unfavorable influences and that for years, I adhered strictly to earlier training and teaching and never to this day have I indulged in even one drink as a beverage, nor using tobacco or coffee, and now (1884) at 70 come July, I am in the enjoyment of uninterrupted health - feel better for 15 years than in early life living on the Arkansas river till 15 years old; I was sick a great deal, I have been living in a healthy part of Texas 37 years and my health seems to have become permanent. I hope through a kind Provider to enjoy many days with friends and loved ones ere I go hence."

"I am somewhat flattered with the news I hear from friend Howell, fondly hope that he may yet be spared to spend many happy days, yea years, with loved ones at home, and the society of his numerous friends who I hear express so great anxiety for his recovery."

Signed Your Friend, E.C. Newton
"Written at Dover, March 27, 1884"

He says in a P S his uncle J. Blair was 10 years old when they left Tennessee in 1815 and old enough to remember most of the events connected with the emigration and settlement in Arkansas."

SEC. 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Territory of Arkansas, That Bazilla Newton, and Larkin Newton, who are Administrators, with the will annexed, of the estate of John Newton, deceased, be, and are hereby, authorized to move said administration to the county of Crawford.*

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of said administrators, to procure a certified copy of all the proceedings touching said administration, from the proper clerk of the county of Pulaski, and file the same with the clerk of the proper court of Crawford county; and when so filed, said administrators shall proceed to settle said ad-*

ministration, in the same manner that they would have done, if administration had been taken out in said county of Crawford; and that all settlements so made shall be good and valid in law and equity;

I know who raised my grandfather, and his brother, Alfred E. HENRY, but I can find no record of the sisters. Later after my grandfather grew up, he received a letter from the State of Arkansas, that he was the heir of a nice farm in Arkansas, but he had only a limited time to claim it, which he didn't! being from AR. I look forward to the weather clearing each year so we can start making our
trips to: Benton, Washington, and Madison Counties in Arkansas. I am enclosing a letter
that was written by my g.g.g. grandmother during the Civil War and she was living in Kings
River, AR at the time she wrote it. This letter is my pride and joy even it it is just a
copy. One of the relatives in Northern California has the original and it is said to be in
very bad condition now. I thought it would be interesting to some of our AFH members &
readers, since it covers a lot of the Civil War history, and also mentions many people in
that area. Some might even be descendants.

The following is a letter written by Jane Page to her son, John Page. John Page and his
wife, Frances, together with their children, left Kingriver, Arkansas, (near Kingston)
and made their way by wagon train to California in 1857. They eventually settled on
some land near Salmon Falls, California - a little foothill town now submerged under
Folsom Lake (a few miles East of the town of Folsom, Calif.).

Kingsriver, Madison County
A.D. Nov. 14, 1866

Dear Son and daughter: I embrace the present opportunity of writing you a letter to let you know that I am still in the land of the living and enjoying very good health and I do hope these few lines may reach you and find you all enjoying the same great Blessing. I have a heap to write to you, more I fear than I shall think of. I have sorrowful news to communicate. Your father fell a victim in time of the great war. He was killed by the Federal forces on the 14th day of March, 1865. He was at Sam's house on the mountain (where he lived when you left) when the Federals charged up it, frightened the old man and he tried to make his escape by running. They charged after him and shot him from the back of the neck down to the waist. He had nine or ten balls passed through his body. So scared and disturbed was everybody that I had to stay with him in the woods all day by myself with my apron spread over the face. We got a little help to bury him. We buried him in the back ground of Sam's orchard. We had to bury him without any coffin but this is not all, Posey is gone. He died a natural death. He died in Federal forces at Little Rock. He lay sick for a long time but at last God released him from his pain and then he went away. Gone to try the realities of an unknown world to us.

I will now tell you all I can about the children that is living. I will begin with Sam. He is living near Fayetteville, Ark. He moved South during the war or rather at the close of it. He lost two of his children while he was South. Dave is living near Kingston, Ark. He has had a good deal of sickness in his family this fall and lost one of his children. Hosea is living near where you lived when you lived on dry creek. He is married and has a family. Cook Cobb is living here in the Settlement. He and family are all well. Frank is married and is living where your father used to live and I am living with him. John Daily is living still higher up the creek than where we live. Milt is in Texas. I got a letter from him a few days since. He is doing very well. James is living near Boggy depot in the nation. He is also doing very well. I believe I have told you all about your brothers and sisters that will interest you.

I now attempt to tell you something about the war in our country, as follows. In the year of '61 they began calling for volunteers here. They made up a company of Confederate Soldiers here in this settlement. They went out and served awhile in the war and then returned home. They were engaged in the Oak Hill battle where they proved victorious, drove the Yankees off the field. The Southern Soldiers then moved out of Missouri and left it to the Yankees. Shortly after they came down in large numbers again. General McCulloch and Price met and encountered them at Elk Horn in Benton County, Ark. in dreadful conflict. The Federals proved victorious and Gen. McCulloch was killed. Price went to the east with Old Ben - fell our country's destruction. The Federals then mustered all their forces and encountered General Hindman and his array of conscripts at Prairie Grove near Fayetteville and whiped him. Drove him across the Arkansas River. Shortly after this battle the Yankees came to Kingsriver and commenced their dreadful slaughter of men and horse stealing. Then their was raised in our settlement independants, companies of lawless bands who went about over the country stealing and robbing everybody without distinction and then after they got everything in our country they turned in and burnt our houses turned out widows and orphans out in the cold winters snow. They entirely robed me out, never left me narry a single horse nor nothing that was worth anything. They never left narry a house in the beautiful little town of Kingston. They nearly burned up Huntsville too. It would have been destroyed if it had not been Headquarters for the thieves that Madison County turned out. They never left but three or four houses from John Combs down to the Halls, a distance of eight or nine miles. This is a faint description of the Great War in our Country. Too restore the constitution and put down the rebellion but have they restored the constitution. You may say, I will not.

I will now try to tell you of all the deaths in your acquaintance. I will begin on Buffalo. They killed Branden Edgmon and three of his sons, Samuel, Abner and Squire. They killed John Grimes and old Mr. Meronells that lived near Huntville. They killed Tony Logan one of the old man Logans sons. They killed John A Hawkins and a great many others that you do not know. All Busham, he was killed at home by the Yankees. Oh I cannot think of them all to save my life. The war has entirely ruined our country. But I think it will build up again in the course of time. The people seems to be in good spirits and are trying to rebuild. If you want to come back to this country to live, you can buy land very cheap here now. It is very low in consequence of the scarcity of money everything is very scarce here and times is hard, hard very hard. For the want of room, I must quit. You must write to me as soon as you get this letter. Write without fail. Give me all the new of every kind in your country. So no more at this time but remains your affectionate mother until death. To John Page and family. Jane Page

OUR LEWIS FAMILY

By Jennie Stone

The following are excerpts taken from "Genealogy of the Lewis Family in America" by William Terrell Lewis copywrite 1892. This book contains many hundreds of Lewis' but I am only including those that are a direct line to my family. I was fortunate to obtain a copy of this book and thought perhaps it might help others working on this line.

Genealogy of the Lewis Family:

There is a tradition in the Lewis family that the name originated in France, and that it was originally spelled "Louis" meaning strong or brave. After the family settled in Wales, the name being Anglieized, it was changed to "Lewis".

About the middle of the seventeenth century four brothers of the Lewis family left Wales, viz.:

- A1. Samuel, went to Portugal; nothing more is known of him.
- A2. William, died in Ireland.
- A3. General Robert died in Gloucester county, VA; and
- *A4. John, died in Hanover county, Va.

JOHN LEWIS OF HANOVER COUNTY, VA.

A1. John Lewis, Sr., one of the original brothers that emigrated from Wales to America was born about 1640. He resided awhile with the Mostyn family in Denbyshire previous to his emigration to America. It is not known whom he married. He died in Hanover county, VA., in 1726.

The records on Hanover county, Va., were burned during the Confederate war by the Federal army.

His will mentions the names of six of his children, they are:

- B1. Mrs. Rebecca Lyndsay, born about 1677
- B2. Abraham, born about 1679
- B3. Sarah, born about 1681
- B4. Mrs. Angelica Fullelove, born about 1683
- *B5. David, born about 1685 and
- B6. John, Jr., born about 1687.

The author did not attempt to trace any of the children of John Lewis, Sr. except those of David his fifth child from whom this branch of the family is lineally descended. There is some information on John, Jr, and also General Robert in the book.

DAVID LEWIS, SR. OF ALBEMARIE COUNTY, VA.

B5. David Lewis, Sr., fifth child of John Lewis, Sr., was born in Hanover, Va., about the year 1685. About the year 1717, he married his first wife, Miss _____ Terrell, daughter, it is said of Joel Terrell, by whom he raised eight children; she dying in 1734, he married his second wife, by whom he had no issue and her name is not known.

(Some information on the Terrell Family available)

About the year 1750 David moved from Hanover county and settled in Albemarie county, Va. Albemarie was then a new county having been carved out of Goochland in 1744. In 1753 after he moved to Albemarie county he married his third wife, the widow of Dr. Hart of Philadelphia, Pa., whose maiden name was Mary McGarth, by whom he raised three children. After the death of this third wife he was engaged to be married the fourth time but died very suddenly before the consummation of the nuptials.

After David Lewis, Sr., moved and settled near where Charlottesville now stands, in Albemarie county he was offered five hundred acres of the best quality of land in Virginia, lying some forty or fifty miles west of the then settlements, for a pair of buckskins which he could have killed almost any day and dressed the next, but he thought at that time the back county would not be settled in an age and that the land would be of no value to him.

In his old age he sometimes taught school gratuitously for the benefit of the poor. He never inflicted corporal punishment upon his pupils but if any of them violated his rules during the week he would on Friday evening tie a bundle of rods to their backs and send them home.

He was a very small man with light hair and blue eyes of strict integrity, benevolent character, and an exemplary member of the Presbyterian church.

David Lewis, Sr., died in Albemarie county, Va., in 1779 from flux, brought on by over-exertion and drinking too much cold water on a hot summer day in August after cutting down a tree in which there was a hawk's nest.

His will was probated at the September term of the Albemarie county court in 1779. Stephen Willis, Anna Willis, Morning Clarkson, Robert Lewis, and Wm. Johnson were subscribing witnesses to said will; and Joel Lewis, John Martin, James Lewis, and Taliaferro Lewis were his executors. He gave a certain amount of property of James Lewis, Elizabeth Martin, Miriam Lewis, Hannah Hickman, Susannah Mackey, Sarah Musick, and Anna Willis, to make them equal with his other children. The balance of his property he divided equally between his eleven children. (He had earlier given property to some of his sons). In 1750 a deed of gift from David Lewis, Sr., to William Terrell Lewis, David Lewis, Jr., John Lewis, and Joel Lewis of lands lying on the branches of Moore's creek was recorded.

His eight children by Miss _____ Terrell, his first wife are:

- C1. William Terrell, born 1718; married Sallie Martin
- C2. Susannah, born 1720; married Alexander Mackey.
- C3. Hannah, born 1722; married James Hickman
- C4. Sarah, born 1724; married Abraham Musick
- C5. Davis, Jr., born 1726 married Rebecca Stovall and Elizabeth Lockhart
- *C6. John, born 1728 married Sarah Taliaferro and Susan Clarkson
- C7. Joel, born 1730; married Mary Tureman, Mrs. Gordon, and Lucy Daniels.
- C8. Anna, born 1733; married Joel Terrel and Stephen Willis

His three children by Mary McGarth, his third wife are:

- C9. Elizabeth, born 1754; married John Martin
- C10. Colonel James, born 1756; married Lucy Thomas and Mary Marks
- C11. Miriam, born 1759, married Colonel Gabriel Madison.

JOHN LEWIS, OF ALBEMARIE COUNTY, VA

C6. John Lewis, son of David and his Wife Miss Ann (?) Terrell, was born in Hanover county, Virginia about the year 1728 where he was raised. As a citizen he was much esteemed by all who knew him. As a husband, father, and brother, he was kind and affectionate, and was a favorite among his sisters; hence, most of them named a son after him. He was twice married; first to Sarah Taliaferro, in 1750, by whom he raised nine children. His first wife having died in 1769, he married as his second wife Susan Clarkson by whom he had three children, but only raised one.

It is not known what year he left Hanover county, but it appears that he was living in Amelia county in 1759 as some of his children were born in that county. He afterwards settled in Albemarle county where his father, brothers and sisters had previously settled. He remained in Albemarle county until just before the Revolutionary war, when he emigrated to and settled in Rutherford county, North Carolina. David, his father, having died in 1779 and after his estate was settled John returned to Albemarle county to attend to the division of said estate and died there in 1784.

The children of John Lewis and Sarah Taliaferro are:

- D1. Robert, born in 1752; died single in Kentucky in 1799.
- D2. Taliaferro, born in 1755; died single in Virginia in 1810.
- D3. Joh, born in 1757; married Ann Berry Earle and died in Georgia.
- D4. Mildred McCoy, born in 1759; married Thomas Rowland and died in South Carolina.
- *D5. Charles Crawford, born in 1761; married Elizabeth Russell and died in North Carolina.
- D6. Jesse Pitman, born in 1763; married Nancy Clarkson and died in Virginia.
- D7. Richard, born in 1765;
- D8. Henry Graves, born in 1767; married Mourning Mills and died in North Carolina
- D9. Frances Rhodes, born in 1767, married William Twitty and died in North Carolina

The children of John Lewis and Susan Clarkson are:

- D10. Susan, born in 1772, died in childhood
- D11. Julius born in 1774; died in childhood
- D12. David Jackson, born in 1774, married Martha Baker and died in Kentucky.

The 8th and 9th, 11th and 12th were twins.

CHARLES C. LEWIS

D5. The Hon. Charles Crawford Lewis, was born in Albemarle county, Virginia in 1761. He was a hatter by trade.

He emigrated to Rutherford county, North Carolina with his father before the Revolutionary war and settled on Mountain Creek, four miles west of Rutherfordton. At the time of their settlement in North Carolina the county was infested with Indians, bears, wolves, etc., which proved a great source of annoyance to the early settlers.

When the Revolutionary war commenced he was only fourteen years of age, but after he arrived at a proper age was in the service. It is not known how long he served in the army as he never applied for a pension.

After his death the following certificate (now filed in the archives of the War Department at Washington City) was found among his papers which, together with other living evidence, enabled his widow to prove his services and to draw a pension:

This is to certify that Charles Lewis, Sergeant, has faithfully served out his tour of three months in General Lillington's brigade, to the southward.

Robert Gilkey, Captain
Andrew Hampton, Colonel.

Charleston, S.C. March 24, 1780.

He acted as a magistrate for some years in Rutherford county, North Carolina, after which he was elected in 1798 as a member in the House of Commons of the State Legislature and only served one term. It was the only time that he ever aspired to that office. He was afterward elected, during life or good behaviour, to the office of register of the county, which office he held upward of thirty years, until about the time of his death, which occurred in 1833.

In 1786 he married Elizabeth Russell, daughter of George Russell from Ireland whose wife was the widow of John Whiteside and whose maiden name was Molly Underwood.

Elizabeth Russell was born in Rutherford county, North Carolina in 1770. She was about five feet three inches in height, weighting about one hundred and fifth pounds with black hair and eyes, and dark skin. In 1848 she made a profession of religion and attached herself to the Baptist church at Mountain Creek Meeting-house in Rutherford county, North Carolina, and died in 1851.

She was a descendant of Molly Brown, the widow of John Brown, who emigrated from Ireland to Virginia. John Brown died shortly after his arrival in Virginia leaving only one son Richard.

His widow afterwards married in Virginia Joseph Underwood by whom she had four more children; 1, Elizabeth; 2, Letty, 3, Joseph, and 4, Molly*.

(4) Molly Underwood, was born in 1734, and died in Rutherford county, North Carolina, in 1828. She first married John Whiteside, Sr., by whom she had three children, 1, Thomas; 2, Mary, and 3, John, Jr. After the death of John Whiteside, Sr., she married George Russell, Sr., an Irishman, who was killed by the INdians while on a bear hunt soon after the close of the Revolutionary war. Molly Underwood and her second husband George Russell had two children; 1, George, Jr., and 2, Elizabeth*.

Charles C. Lewis and Elizabeth Russell were married in Rutherford county, North Carolina in the year 1786. They had thirteen children but raised only twelve, they are:

- E1. George Russell, born 1788, died single in Winston, Mississippi, 1867
- E2. Pitman, born 1789, married Iantha Dalton; died in Rutherford county, North Carolina, 1858.
- E3. Mary, born 1791; married Moses Simmons; died in Rutherford county, North Carolina, 1877.
- E4. Sarah, born 1793; married Joshua Simmons; died in Marshall county, Mississippi, 1891
- E5. John, born 1795; died a bachelor in Rutherford county, North Carolina 1883.
- E6. Mildred, born 1799; married Colonel Ed. Patterson; died 1856; buried in South Carolina.
- E7. Elizabeth, born 1800; married Aaron W. Whiteside; died in North Carolina, 1862.
- *E8. Charles C., Jr., born 1802; married Jane Flack; died in Texas, 1846.
- E9. Nancy, born 1804; married Jon. Whiteside and John Dickey.
- E10. Preston, born 1806; married Martha Blanton; died in Rutherford, NC
- E11. Jesse T., born 1808; married Susan Cowart, Rutherford, NC
- E12. Wm. Terrell, born 1811; married Eliza J. Steele and Mary Ann B Norton, Winston county, Mississippi (This is the author)

Charles Lewis, Sr., and his wife, Elizabeth, both died in Rutherford, NC on the same farm upon which he settled before the Revolutionary war. He died in 1833 and she in 1851.

CHARLES C. LEWIS, JR.

E8. Charles C. Lewis, Jr., son of Charles C., Sr. was born in 1802. In 1825 he married Jane Flack, daughter of George Flack of Rutherford county North Carolina. George Flack raised but three children, 1, John, 2, Jane*, and 3 Andrew.

Charles Crawford Lewis, Jr., was about five feet six inches in height, weighting about one hundred and thirty five pounds with light hair and blue eyes. He died in Montgomery county Texas in 1846 while on a visit to that county. His widow and children were in Yell county Arkansas. He had three children:

- *F1. George Washington, born in Rutherford county, North Carolina, in 1826
- F2. Elizabeth Louisa, born in Rutherford county, North Carolina,
- F3. Emily Warner, born in Rutherford county North Carolina in 1834

Jane Flack, his wife died in Yell county, Arkansas in 1885.

GEORGE WASHINGTON LEWIS

F1. George W. was born in 1826. In 1847 he married Margaret Ann DeBerry, in Yell county Arkansas by whom he had six children:

- G1. Cordelia Melissa, born in 1848; married Franklin Waters
- G2. Jonathan Winfield, born in 1850, married Amanda Waters
- G3. Gerard Chesterfield, born in 1853; married Mary Pruitt
- G4. Sterling Menafield, born in 1855, and died in 1864
- G5. Genela Belona, born in 1857; married William Putnam
- *G6. Andrew Terrell, born in 1859; married Susan Amanda Herring. They have children, H1, Minter Terrell; H2 *William Oscar; H3 Susan; H4, Nettie Dorcas, and H5, Lenty May.

The wife of George W. Lewis died in 1862, and he married as his second wife, Gillie McCutchen, by whom he had two children,

- G8. Minter Flack

George Washington Lewis was in the Confederate Army and was killed through a mistake by a Mr. _____ Foster, within five miles of his own home.

Miscellaneous information not taken from the "Genealogy of the Lewis Family" book.

Sir Edward Lewis, born in 1557 in Brecon, Wales, married Lady Anne the daughter of the Earl of Dorset. Had one child known, Robert Lewis*

*Robert Lewis, born in 1579 in Brecon, Wales, wife unknown, had four boys, Samuel, William, General Robert, and *John Lewis, Sr.

The * beside a name means it is a direct line to me. The book ends with my grandfather William Oscar Lewis. Johnson und Pope Counties in Arkansas.

Die von den Bürgern von Johnson und Pope Counties des Staates im Jahre 1907 gegründete Deutsche Gegenseitige Feuer-Unterstützungs-Gesellschaft hat sich über folgende Paragraphen geeinigt und dieselben angenommen:

1. Der Name der Gesellschaft soll sein: „Deutsche Farmer Feuer-Unterstützungs-Gesellschaft“, und der Zweck:

2. Uns bei vorkommenden Feuerverlusten zu unterstützen und zu helfen, und zwar so, daß ein jeder dabei beteiligt, nach den von ihm versicherten Gebäuden u. s. w. nach Prozenten, wie es von dem Beamten herrührt, beiträgt.

3. Niemand kann wegen Nichtzahlung seines Beitrags gerichtlich belangt oder verklagt werden; doch schließt sich Jeder durch Weigern der Zahlung des Beitrags von der Gesellschaft und allen Vorteilen derselben aus und wird nachher nicht wieder als Mitglied aufgenommen.

4. Der Wirkungsbereich der Gesellschaft wird in verschiedenen Distrikte abgeteilt, als No. 1, No. 2 u. s. w., wovon jeder Distrikt einen verantwortlichen Vormann ernimmt, der in seinem Distrikt nachträgliche Taxationen zu besorgen, das Mitgliederbuch zu führen, Bekanntmachungen zu machen, Gelder zu kollektieren und sonstige die Gesellschaft betreffende Geschäfte zu besorgen hat.

5. Der Wirkungsbereich der Gesellschaft soll in Johnson und Pope Counties in Arkansas sein. Doch können sich auch Familien anderer Counties einem ihnen nahe gelegenen Distrikt anschließen.

6. Die Gesellschaft verpflichtet sich, bei Verlust des taxierten Werts des versicherten Eigentums im Falle eines Brandes zu bezahlen, und zwar 30 Tage nachdem der Präsident davon in Kenntnis gesetzt, der allbald mit dem Sekretär die Auflage zu berechnen und sie dem Vormann jedes Distrikts mitzutheilen hat, welcher sie dann in seinem Bezirk auf die ihm bestmögliche Weise den Gliedern bekannt zu machen hat.

7. Der Vormann eines jeden Distrikts hat als verantwortlicher Beamter innerhalb 20 Tagen nach Bericht vom Sekretär die fälligen Gelder in seinem Bezirk zu kollektieren und, falls der Braub in seinem Bezirk vorgefallen, die von ihm so kollektierten Gelder, auf Anweisung des Präsidenten, gegen Quittung dem vom Brande Betroffenen zuzustellen. Die übrigen Distrikts-Vormänner haben die Beiträge dem Sekretär ringuldingen, der sie dann auf Anweisung vom Präsidenten dem vom Brande Betroffenen oder dem betreffenden Distrikts-Vormann zu übergeben hat.

8. Jeder, der Mitglied werden will, hat sich an einen ihm zunächst wohnenden Distrikts-Vormann zu wenden, die gehalten sind, alle nachherige Taxation innerhalb 10 Tagen, nachdem sie davon in Kenntnis gesetzt, zu vollziehen; sollen sie aber durch Umstände daran verhindert werden, so haben sie es dem Präsidenten zu melden, der dann ein anderes Mitglied mit der Besorgung der Taxation zu beauftragen hat.

9. Die Gesellschaft versichert vorläufig nur Gebäude für die Dauer von fünf Jahren, doch dürfen einzelne Gebäude für nicht mehr als \$500.00 taxiert und versichert werden. Glieder haben alle mögliche Vorsicht anzuwenden, um Feuergefahr zu verhüten. Keine muß 15 Fuß von Gebäulichkeiten entfernt werden. Öfenrohre müssen in Schornsteine münden. Das Rauchen in und außer den Gebäuden (Wohnhaus ausgeschlossen), sowie bei Strohscheubern und dergleichen, ist verboten, ebenso das leichtfertige Tragen von Zündhölzern in der Tasche oder der Gebrauch von fehlerhaften Laternen. Jedes Mitglied ist verpflichtet, die Andern zu ermahnen, auch seinem Vormann zu berichten, daß es dieses Glied ermahnt, oder im Falle von Mißachtung dieser Ermahnung dasselbe bei irgend einem Beamten anzuzeigen. Der Beamte hat in diesem Falle dem Mitgliede eine Strafe von \$5.00 aufzuerlegen.

10. Alle fünf Jahre findet eine Haupt- oder General-Taxation statt, die von einem Distrikts-Vormann in seinem Bezirk vollzogen wird. Die Taxatoren haben von jedem hundert Dollars meist versicherten Eigentum 25 Cent und \$1.00 Eintrittsgeld zu erheben, und dem Eigentümer gleich seine Police zu geben, worauf Name, Nummer, Distrikt und Wert des versicherten Eigentums einzeln angegeben sind.

Januar, mittags 12 Uhr, an und hält fünf Jahre später zu der angegebenen Zeit wieder auf; ebenso kauft jede nachträglich ausgestellte Police mit der oben bestimmten, in der General-Taxation angegebenen Zeit aus. Keine Police hat Gültigkeit, bis sie bezahlt ist.

12. Die Mitglieder sind gehalten, auf der Jahresversammlung zu erscheinen, die am ersten Montag im August jeden Jahres, nachmittags um 2 Uhr beginnend, stattfindet, widrigenfalls sie 50 Cent Strafe an ihren Distrikts-Vormann zu zahlen haben innerhalb 30 Tagen; sollten betreffende

Wieder diesem nicht nachkommen, dann haben sie auf der nächsten Jahresversammlung einen Dollar zu entrichten, und im Falle sie dann setzen und keine genügende Entschuldigung einbringen; wer sich weigert seinen Dollar zu zahlen, ohne genügende Entschuldigung, der schließt sich selber aus. Frauen und Minderjährige sind in diesem Paragraphen aufgenommen.

13. Niemand kann zugleich bei uns und anderen guten Gesellschaften dasselbe Eigentum versichern, es sei denn mit Wissen und Willen der Beamten, und der Verkauf oder Vererben von versichertem Eigentum hebt jede Verbindung mit der Gesellschaft auf, von dem Tage an, da die dahinzulegenden Papiere aufgestellt sind. Minderjährige Erben sind aufgenommen; der Vormund oder Guardian hat in diesem Falle alle Gebühren an die Gesellschaft zu entrichten. Ferner, daß minderjährigen Erben, deren Eigentum versichert ist, es bleibt, bis ein Vormund oder Guardian über dasselbe eingesetzt ist. Sollte der ernannte Vormund oder Guardian es veräumen oder sich weigern, alle Gebühren an die Gesellschaft zu entrichten, so hebt sich die Verbindlichkeit zwischen Mitglied und Gesellschaft zu derselben Stunde auf.

14. Die Gesellschaft versichert Gebäude, die verrentet sind und werden, doch müssen solche Gebäude in gutem Stande erhalten bleiben.

15. Jeder vom Brande Betroffene hat seine auf ihn fallenden Procente mitzutragen.

16. Alle Bücher und Verhandlungen werden in deutscher Sprache geführt.

17. Die Beamten haben in ihren Distrikten bei vorkommenden Bränden alles genau zu beaufsichtigen und dem Entstehen des Feuers, wenn möglich, auf die Spur zu kommen, und nach Bericht des Vormanns hat der Präsident (nach Beratung mit anderen Beamten) das Recht, in zweifelhaften Fällen die Zahlung der Beiträge bis zur nächsten Jahresversammlung zu verschieben. Stimmensmehrheit entscheidet.

18. Jeder Vormann und Beamter ist verpflichtet, bei seinem Amtsantritt das Eigentum der Gesellschaft an seinen Amtsnachfolger abzugeben und abzuliefern und er behält das Amt solange, bis andere erwählt und installiert sind. Ebenso sind sie verpflichtet, auf der Jahresversammlung zu erscheinen und Bericht abzustatten, bei einer Warnung von fünf Dollars, es sei denn, sie werden entschuldigt.

19. Alle einflussierten Gelder sind dem Sekretär einzuhändigen oder abzugeben, um die laufenden Ausgaben für

Bücher, Polizen u. s. w. zu bestreiten, der darüber in der nächsten Jahresversammlung Rechnung abzulegen hat.

20. Alle Beamten werden nur für die von ihnen verwendete Zeit bezahlt, die sie bei der Jahresversammlung geoffenhalten angegeben haben, zu zwei Dollars per Tag.

21. Die Wahl der Beamten der Gesellschaft findet alle zwei Jahre auf der Jahresversammlung statt, und in der letzten Jahresversammlung vor der General-Taxation wird es der Gesellschaft überlassen, ob sie einen fach- und fachverständigen Mann, der mit dem Distrikt-Vormann die General-Taxation zu vollbringen hat, wählen soll.

22. Ebenso wird von der Gesellschaft insgesamt ein Präsident erwählt, der über das Ganze zu wachen und an welchen alle Vorkommnisse zu berichten sind, der auch alle Zahlungs-Anweisungen zu unterschreiben, vorkommende Taxationen bis zur Wahl durch Ernennung zu setzen und in Versammlungen zu präsidieren hat;

sowie einen Vize-Präsidenten, der in Abwesenheit oder in anderen Fällen des Präsidenten Platz einnimmt und vertritt.

23. und einen Sekretär, der zugleich das Amt eines Schatzmeisters mit versieht, der über alle Mitglieder und deren versichertes Eigentum ein Buch zu führen, die Protokolle einzutragen, die Polizen mit zu unterzeichnen hat. Diese Gelder sollen in guten soliden Banken deponiert werden. Falls aber Verkäufe vorkommen (d. h. durch Bankrott), die Gesellschaft dieselben tragen soll.



CONSTITUTION
of the
GERMAN FARMER FIRE-RELIEF-COMPANY
OF
Johnson and Pope Counties in Arkansas

The German mutual fire relief company founded in 1907 by the citizens of Johnson and Pope counties has agreed and espoused the following paragraphs:

1. The name of the company shall be "The German Farmer Fire-Relief-Company," and the purpose,
2. To support and help ourselves at occurring losses by fire, and indeed in such a way, that each sharer is aided according to premiums on insured buildings etc, as calculated by the officers.
3. No one can be legally accused or sued on account of non-payment of his contribution; however, everyone ends his connection with the company through refusal of payment and all benefits of the company and will not thereafter be taken in as a member.
4. The company's sphere of activity will be separated into several districts, as No. 1, No. 2 etc., each of which elects a responsible foreman, who in his district has to take care of valuations, keep the district record book, make notifications, collect moneys and otherwise care for company related business.
5. The area of the company's activity shall be in Johnson and Pope counties in Arkansas
6. The company has obligated itself to pay three-fourths of the appraised worth of the property in case of a fire, and to do it 30 days after the president gains knowledge of the fire. The president is to compute the assessment with the secretary and communicate it to the foreman of each district, who then, in what is to him the best possible way, make it known to the members in his district.
7. The foreman of each district has, as responsible official, 20 days after the report of the secretary to collect the money due in his district, and, in case the fire happened in his district, deliver the money collected to the one struck by fire, as instructed by the president, and get a receipt. The other district foremen are to hand in the premiums to the secretary, who then, upon instruction by the president, is to deliver them to the fire affected one or the respective foreman.
8. Everyone, who wishes to become a member, has to go to the foreman living near to him. The obligations are, all subsequent appraisement inside of ten days, after that is known to execute the matter. However, should circumstances cause it not to be done, it should be reported to the president, who then is to empower another member to take care of the appraisement.
9. The company insures provisionally only buildings for the duration of five years, moreover single buildings may not be appraised and insured for more than \$500.00. Members are to take all possible precaution to prevent danger of fire. Stove-pipes must go into chimneys. Smoking in and outside the buildings (dwelling excepted), as well as at straw-stacks and the like, is forebidden, also the frivolous carrying of matches in the pocket or the use of defective lanterns. Every member is obliged to warn the others, also to report to his foreman that a member was warned, or in the case of disregard of this warning to point it out sometime to an officer. The officer in this case is to impose a fine of \$5.00 on the member.
10. Every five years a main or general appraisal takes place, which a district foreman will execute in his area. The appraisers have to raise 25 cents from every hundred dollars worth of insured property, plus \$1.00 entrance fee, and to immediately give to the proprietor his policy, on which name, number, district and worth of the insured property are given in detail.
In the general appraisal every foreman has to name a specialist in his district, who is also a member of the company. Both of these have to execute the appraisal.
11. Every general appraisal policy drawn up begins with the following January 1 at noon and ceases five years later at the same time; just as every supplemental policy runs out at the above assigned time.
No policy has validity until it is paid.
12. The members are obligated to appear at the annual meeting, which takes place on the first Monday of August of every year, beginning about 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Failing this they have to pay 50 cents fine to their district foreman within 30 days. Should respective members not comply, then they have to pay a dollar at the next annual meeting, and whoever refuses to pay his dollar, without satisfactory excuse, disqualifies himself. Women and minors are excepted.
13. No one can be at the same time insured by our company and other good companies, with the knowledge and will of the officers, and the sale or inheritance of insured property breaks off every connection with our company from the day the transferring papers are drawn up. Minor heirs are excepted; the trustee or guardian has in this case all dues to the society to pay. Furthermore, minor heirs, whose property is insured, remain insured until a trustee or guardian is appointed. Should the named trustee or guardian neglect or refuse to pay all dues to the company, then the connection between the member and the company breaks off at the same time.

14. The company insures buildings which are rented and will be rented, however, such buildings must be maintained in good condition.

15. Everyone struck with a fire has to contribute the portion of the tax falling on him

16. All books and transactions will be kept in the German language.

17. At fires the officers of the district are to carefully inspect and discover the origin of the fires, if possible from the remains, and after report of the foreman, the president has (after consultation with the other officers) the right, in suspicious cases to postpone payment until the next annual meeting. Majority decides.

18. Every foreman and officer is obligated, on his leaving office to hand over and consign the property of the company to his successor in office and he holds the office until another is elected and installed. They are also obligated to appear and report to the annual meeting, on a fine of five dollars, unless they are excused.

19. All collected monies are handed-over or delivered to the secretary, to defray the running expenses for books, policies etc., which the secretary has to account for at the next annual meeting.

20. All officers are only paid for the time employed, which they conscientiously give an account of at the annual meeting, at the rate of two dollars a day.

21. The election of the officers takes place every two years at the annual meeting, and in the last annual meeting before the general-taxation the company will decide whether it shall elect a specialist and expert, who with the district foreman, is to complete the general-taxation or assessment.

22. Likewise the society in a body will elect a president, who is to watch over the whole and report all events, who also is to sign all checks, fill vacancies until election by nomination and to preside in meetings.

23. Likewise a vice-president, who in absence or sickness of the president takes his place and acts in his stead.

24. And a secretary, who at the same time is to discharge the duties of a treasurer, is to keep a book of all members and their properties insured, take minutes and underwrite the policies.

25. Every district, on the other hand, elects a foreman for itself. The foremen are to be elected by ballot.

26. Members who live inside town limits may be insured by us; they must, however, have their residence 50 feet from the nearest resident. Furthermore, if sometime something is built within 50 feet, then the policy is invalid.

27. For damages by lightning, as well as damages by wind and storm, the company is liable. Damages under \$10 will not be paid.

28. Insured property in our company, property loaded with a mortgage, is, as soon as a mortgage is ofre-closed in open court, invalid.

29. At all occurring fires two appraisors must be present.

"THE FAMILY OF NEW", by Ann Wall Allgood and Janet New Huff, P. O. Box 1487, Natchez, Miss., 39120. Price \$30.00, hardback, 1981, 8½x11 inches on heavy glossy paper, 212 pages with full-name index.

This is the genealogy of descendants of Richard New, immigrant to Virginia in 1637, with specific emphasis on Council Bryant New, Jr., of Union County, Arkansas, and his descendants thru 1981.

The family history is well organized and documented with an attractive use of family pictures. The maps and copies of land records make the history more graphic. The many families listed by generations give an even flowing progression thru the years. Many allied family names are Bell, Bishop, Brasher, Cross, Davis, Darden, Foster, Hamm, Hodges, Jones, Lee, Lipscomb, Mason, McCrary, Miller, Rackley, Smith, Thompson, Wells and Word. "PRAIRIE COUNTY, ARKANSAS, including LONOKE COUNTY (before 1873), 1860 Census has been published and is now available for purchase. Maps of both counties are shown on the soft cover to give the territory this census covers. There are 127 pages including a surname index, 8½x11 inches. 

Due to the fact that Oklahoma was Indian Territory until 1907, in many cases the only record of a family was by tombstones. The census for Indian Lands was made only every 10 years. This volume gives mostly small cemeteries, 33 in number, of which some are unnamed and listed by Range and Township numbers. All available information is included. Locations and how to reach cemeteries are given. The information is easy to read. We appreciate the donation of this book to our library.

It is there for the use of all, so leave it there. The price of a roll is \$15.00. The microfilm for all of Arkansas has been ordered but is not anticipated to arrive before January 1983 because of the large number of orders from all over the country. We might be lucky.

Mr. Baker has earned another "pat on the back" from all of us by putting together a great deal of information about the "townships" in each county of Arkansas. It is in a home-made notebook and is available at the "call desk" at the Research Room of the History Commission. It might be called a History of the Townships but it is a great deal of information and he has worked a long while for our benefit. It's not enough for me to thank him you should do it also.
