

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Editorial Policy

AGS welcomes contributions of family records, public record transcriptions, and other information of interest to those interested in family history and genealogy in general, and in Arkansas specifically. Responsibility for the accuracy of information and for omissions, or factual errors is that of the contributor.

Manuscript Submissions

Submitters of articles and material for possible publication in *The AFH* are requested to send typewritten or mechanically generated manuscripts on white, 8 1/2 X 11 inch paper, double-spaced, one-inch margins on all sides, with all pages numbered. The sources from which the material was obtained, specific statements of facts, or statistical information **MUST** be documented, that is, the specific, detailed source description must be listed either within the body of the text or as notes. Previous publication of the material in any form must be brought to the attention of AGS. AGS encourages submissions on IBM compatible computer disks in WordStar or ASCII format accompanied by a hard copy of the material.

AGS offers individual, institutional, sustaining, life and honorary membership classes. Membership is by calendar year and may be entered at any time of the year (late subscribers will receive the year's back issues of *The Arkansas Family Historian*). Individual membership is \$15 per year.

Bobbie Jones McLane is and has been (except for her term as president) our AGS treasurer and is a life member of AGS. She has served two previous seven-year terms as an Arkansas History Commissioner and has been reappointed by the Governor for a third term on the Commission. Bobbie has more than 30 years' experience in genealogy and family history, tracing her own lines back to, among other notables, a Mayflower pilgrim and Henry II of England. President's Page

As the new president of Arkansas Genealogical Society, I am honored that the membership found me worthy of election to that office - but I'm experiencing trepidation at the thought of following in office so dynamic a leader as Past-President Desmond Walls Allen! Under her two years of energetic leadership, AGS launched several outstanding and successful projects, including the surname directory, the microfiching of the back issues of *The Arkansas Family Historian* and of AGS publications, and the new Certificates of Arkansas Ancestry. These projects assisted AGS membership to new heights. Desmond was honored for her service at the AGS Fall Seminar. All of us in AGS, including Desmond in her capacity as a member of the AGS Board of Directors, will work at sustaining the positive momentum she has given us.

I hope you're all as excited as I am over the new Certificates of Arkansas Ancestry. I've already begun my application. Although filling out the application will take you a fair amount of time and effort, I think you will find it to be worthwhile: not only will you receive a beautiful certificate, but you will be depositing your lineage with AGS, where it will be preserved. As I also discovered, the process of organizing my research in a coherent fashion was required to fill out the application, and anything that prompts us to improve the organization of our genealogy should be welcomed. After I file my papers on one ancestor, I plan to submit applications for several more.

Speaking of organizing your genealogical research -- for what purpose do we spend many years and go to considerable expense to trace our family trees, if all of our research just sits there in folders filled with notes decipherable to no one other than ourselves (and sometimes not even to ourselves)? I've found it very helpful to take an hour or so periodically to type out what I know, what I think I know, and what I want to know about a particular family line I've been working on lately. Then I file that paper in the file so everything will still make sense when I pick it up months or years later.

Even better is to select a family line occasionally to "write up." Study similar articles in genealogical periodicals and read a genealogical reference book to learn the best way to organize your family for an article. Then write it and send it to a periodical you think would be interested in it, like *The Arkansas Family Historian*. If you don't want to publish, consider sending a copy to local libraries or archives and to other members of the family.

So often we put off this step in our research because we don't know all the answers; but, if you've been doing genealogical research for more than a week, you know we NEVER know all the answers. Better to write up and publish what we do know than to never write it up at all. Besides, in my experience, as soon as you publish something, a hundred people immediately tell you where you went wrong (I don't know where all these people are BEFORE you publish!) After your article is printed, you'll be surprised at all the letters you get, filling in some of the gaps and giving you new clues.

Putting our family lines together in a coherent manner, even if incomplete, is what makes all our years of research worthwhile - to us and to those who follow us.

Ancestral File Available

The Family History library announced in a recent newsletter that their Ancestral File would be distributed to more than 500 family history centers by the end of October, 1990. Everyone is invited to contribute to this project by submitting family data on computer diskette(s) in GEDCOM (Genealogical Data Communication) format. Software that is approved as Ancestral File compatible:

- Personal Ancestral File 2.2
 - Roots III (Commsoft Inc.)
 - Everyone's Family Tree (Dollarhide)
 - Family Roots (Quinsept, Inc.)
 - Family Ties (Computer Services)
 - Family Tree Maker Exchange Utility (Banner Blue Software, Inc.)
 - Family Tree Print Utility (Common Sense Software)
 - Generation Gap Plus (Flying Pigs Software)
- [Most of these have registered trademarks]

If you wish to share your family information, you should computerize your data using one of the above programs. Check it carefully and try to avoid any duplications. Send your diskette(s) to:

Include source information in your notes, but try to avoid personal, autobiographical

or historical notes. Cite the best sources available for each person and event, describing each so anyone can find it, and note any peculiarities and its accuracy.

Source notes are not displayed in Ancestral File, but are stored electronically, and some are on microfilm.

You should also advise them if you are interested in receiving information on specific names.

Make copies of your diskette(s) as they cannot return them, nor can they tell you whether your information links with others already in the file, nor when your information has been added.

Check with a Family History Center near you to learn when the updated file has been received.

One of our members submitted information on Mary Whitney to the Post Office and received a reply from the Postal Inspection Service of Bala-Cnnywyd, PA 19004-9000 stating they found no violation of federal statutes under their jurisdiction.

Member Kay Walker Peterson of Artesia, NM, sent us copies of several letters and cards from Elizabeth Ross (using numerous family names as a middle name), Sol Parrish, Dennis B. Haslinger, Sharon Taylor, and all are from the same computer, it appears. The loophole to the schemes now is a refund offer; but do you believe that? We'd be pleased to hear from anyone who has received a refund. Keep submitting these solicitations to the postal people.

SECOND SEARCY COUNTY ANCESTOR FAIR will be held Saturday, March 20, 1991, in the National Guard Armory, Marshall, Arkansas. The first Fair the Searcy County History Group sponsored last year was so stimulating and so much fun the participants wanted to do it again.

An Ancestor Fair is a genealogical swap-shop. One cannot swap an undocumented great-grandmother, for whom no one has been able to find a parentage, for a fully documented great-grandmother with an unclaimed inheritance at the Searcy County Ancestor Fair. However, an ancestor hunter may learn some interesting trivia and may find a missing link in Marshall at the 1991 Fair. Searcy County is a difficult county to do genealogical work in due to a three times burned courthouse and not all cemeteries have been copied; many have been destroyed and lost.

Arkansas Genealogical Society's Certificates of Arkansas Ancestry

AGS is offering Certificates of Arkansas Ancestry to recognize direct descendants of early Arkansas settlers. The certificates will be issued in three categories: Territorial - a resident of Arkansas before our admission to the Union on 15 June 1836; Antebellum - a resident of Arkansas before secession on 6 May 1861; and Nineteenth Century - a resident of Arkansas before 31 December 1900.

Certificate application booklets are ready for distribution now. The application consists of three sections. The first is a lineage (listing of ancestors in one line) from the applicant backward in time to the ancestor who first lived in Arkansas. Vital statistics and source document citation are required. Photocopies of source documents are not required for this section, but the documents must be listed for each generation. Part two is a family group sheet for the original Arkansas ancestor. It also requires the listing of source documents. Part three is a request for submission of a photocopy (or notarized transcription) of the document which proves residency in Arkansas. This document can be a tax record, any county record (such as a deed, will, probate documents, marriage record, county court item, or others), land patent, military record, contemporary newspaper article, petition or a variety of other primary sources which show the ancestor was a resident in Arkansas. Census records showing children born in Arkansas will be considered a primary source. For example, if the ancestor is listed on the 1850 census of Arkansas with a child, age 9, birthplace shown as Arkansas, in the household, residence in Arkansas in 1841 would be assumed. However, the 1900 census showing an eighty-year-old ancestor born in Arkansas would not prove residency in Arkansas in 1820 - evidence closer to the event would be needed.

Complete directions are given in the application booklet.

Membership in AGS is not required to apply for a certificate (we will encourage applicants to join us!). The cost for a certificate is \$10, payable when the application booklet is submitted. When the application is received, it will be reviewed and if there are questions about its contents, a letter will be mailed to the applicant. No one will be "turned down" or "rejected"; rather an application with insufficient evidence which cannot be clarified or supplemented upon request will be returned to the applicant for additional research with a "notice of information not proved."

Our purpose in issuing these certificates is first of all to recognize the descendants of our pioneers; then to gather information for some possible future publication or research file; and finally to make a few dollars for the society which our treasurer will see are well spent.

Why would anyone want a Certificate of Arkansas Ancestry? We spend a great deal of time researching our ancestors and we're proud of our detective work! We all enjoy seeing our efforts rewarded. Gathering the information needed for a Certificate can help us fill in overlooked gaps in our research. We might be motivated to write an article or book about our ancestor and include a photocopy of the Certificate we received. And can't we impress the relatives with a noteworthy document displayed on our office wall? It's a way, too, of sharing our research with others.

Gold Prospector from Arkansas Writes Home

(copy of a letter from CHARLES B. SANDERS, who was in California prospecting for gold, to his brother, GEORGE WOODWARD SANDERS, JR., of Huntsville, Arkansas)

California, Sept 3d, 1850
Dear brother and sister

it is with much pleasure that I except of the present opportunity of righting you a few lines which will inform you that through the blessing of kind providence I am still in the land of the living and blesst with good health at this time. and Cincerally hoping these few lines may come to hand and find you all enjoying the same like blessings. your very interesting letter of April 5th came to hand on the 17th of August. which afforded us all the greatest of satisfaction to hear that you was all well and doing well. I cannot say that I have anything of much interest to right. I do not know of any one making very much at this time. the company above us have got the water turnd they have been at work for 8 to 10 days in the river and have not made much yet. still they may. but it causes me to have some little doubt about the value of our claim. so if it does not pay us for all the labor and Expenche that we have been at. I may not leave hear this fall. however I have not desided whether I will or will not go home this fall. their is a good many of our old acquaintances getting hear and they are vary anxious for Joseph and Myself to stay with them. but Allan and George will go. as they seem altogether in that notion. they say they will start the first of Nov. whether we do or not. we learned a few days since that the people still higher up on this stream was a doing vary well at least some of them and some was a doing well on this stream some two or three milds below...but how ours will turn out we cannot tell. still every appearance seems vary flattering. their is a number of persons at work on the bank clear out of the watter oposit our claim and making from 8 to 16 dollars per day to the hand. but their is a great many hear who seem to do almost nothing. and out of money and every thing else that

they need. their is entirely two many people hear now. if the emegrantion this ceason had staid at home it would have been better for them and us two. and I have no doubt for the whole community at large. for it they come another ceason as this their will be more an knuff as it is. though you that have not experienced a trip of this king cannot tell any thing about it...from what little we discovered...and the river deegings is all taken up and will be dug out this fall. still a man can dig almost any whare and make a little. but that will not pay a man for all his trouble and expence. at least it would take him a long time to make a fortune. health hear generally speaking is not vary good...though not vary many deaths. the most sickness is amongst the new Emergrants. we have been throwd back with our work in consequence of the walling washing down in our race... now it seems that nothing could give me a greater satisfaction and peace of mind...than to be at home with you all. but I do not want to come...as I am hear as long as I can make anything. for I know the chance is dull to make it fast in the States. I think I will have a better chance to make an other ceason than any of the new emegrants. as I know more about the country than they do. you will say to brother John and Gildia Long that I have rote to them twice and have not yet saw the scratch of a pen from them. I have riten to several others that have not rote to me. So they will be certain to answer the next one I right to them. you will tell brother Willis Beard that James black is hear he has been vary sick but on the mend. I will right to you again as soon as we prospect river I will then be able to let you know whether I will come home this ceason or not. you will give our best respects to all Enquiring friends. and to the girls in particular. and except for your selves our love and best wishes so nothing more at present but rem your most affectionate brother untill seperated by death.



This is the inscription on a tombstone erected in 1975 in the Bolinger Cemetery, located about 10 miles south of Kingston, Arkansas. Funds for the new marker were solicited by Mrs. Sibyl Carter of Huntsville, Arkansas, and the late Alva Burk of Kingston, Arkansas. When the new tombstone was ordered neither Sibyl Carter nor Alva Burk knew the first names of Burk or Tucker listed on the headstone. They also did not know the exact date of the death of Burk or Tucker.

What are the facts about the two men buried in the same grave "by their women." Since John A. Tucker is my great-grandfather, I decided to seek more information about this mystery. First, let me review some of the stories, traditions and differing interpretations that have been circulated about what happened.

Version 1 Burk (age 49) and Tucker (age 55) were too old to keep up with the military company to which they were attached and were riding two colts which had been abandoned by enemy troops. They were straggling behind foot soldiers and apparently Confederate bush'wackers shot them not very far from home. Since all of the men had left the area, it took seven women and one young boy to get them on an oxcart to take them to the cemetery. That is why they are buried together as there were only women available to dig the grave. [Source: Sibyl Carter, Huntsville, AR]

Version 2 According to this tradition, "Burk and Tucker were hiding their horses from

Civil War soldiers (either Union or Confederate or both). They brought their horses to Kings River to water them, were surprised and shot to death by the soldiers who then left with the horses. Their women, Burk and Tucker widows, were left to bury them, which they did hurriedly, putting both bodies into a grave they had to dig. (The grave went unmarked until 1975 although many Burks and Tuckers knew about its existence and location.) [Source: Bobby Zylstra, Everson, WA]

Version 3 "It is said that William Joseph Lafayette Burk and a Mr. Tucker (I have never heard his first name although I believe it to be John A.) were not actively engaged in the War for some reason. Some say that they were never in any organized unit and were hiding out in the bluffs along Kings River; while others say they were home on leave or absent from their unit. They were keeping out of sight of soldiers in any case - because found at home, either Union or Confederate troops would probably kill them thinking they were deserters or enemy regulars. Two men and two young boys (their ages were supposed to be 12-14 years old) had taken their horses to Kings River for a drink of water. The horses had been hidden to keep them from being stolen. The small party was crossing the bottoms after watering the horses, where they encountered a small band of men who shot them both dead and stole their horses. The women came back and stood guard over the bodies until morning to protect them from wild animals. The women buried them the next morning in a single grave that they dug. The young boys didn't help for

fear of being shot by the bush-whackers"
[Source: Joy Russell, Witter, AR)

Version 4 John A. Tucker was killed by bush-whackers during the Civil War, probably during the year of 1863. John A. Tucker, Joseph Burk and a young boy were walking on a road that went next to the Pharris field where you could see about one-fourth mile. When the men saw the outlaws coming they told the boy to run and hide in the bushes beside the river. The two men ran in another direction. The outlaws found the two men and killed them. The boy went home which was nearby and told his mother. The women got together and buried them in the same grave. (Source: John D. Little, Kingston, AR)

What are the facts on which there can be a general agreement regarding the death and burial of Burk and Tucker? They were neighbors. In the 1860 Census of Madison County, AR, Kings River Township, the Tucker residence is number 746 and the Burk residence is Number 753. When the widow of Joseph Burk filed for a widow's pension the following affidavit was made on February 8, 1883. "Susan A. Tucker and Salinda Casey testify that they saw the soldier (Joseph Burk's) body after he was killed. He was killed by a company or squad of rebels on Kings River, Arkansas, September 6, 1864, were not present at killing but heard the report of the guns. Said soldier at the time of death was with a squad of said Captain Bivens Company. Susan L. Tucker, P. O. Kingston, Madison County, Arkansas, and Salinda Casey in Aurora, Madison County, Arkansas." (Salinda Tucker is a daughter of John A. Tucker and married Alfred Casey, my gr-gr uncle. Susan L. Tucker is the wife of John A. Tucker's son Robert S. Tucker).

According to Joseph Burk's widow (Sarah Felkins Burk) pension application, Burk was a member of Captain Bevins Independent Company, AR Cavalry. The National Archives has no record of federal military service for Joseph Burk. Captain Bevins Company was probably an informal organization which some referred to as "home guards". Joseph Burk's widow application for a federal pension was denied.

In the 170 census of Madison County, AR, Sarah Felkins Burk was the head of the household of seven children living at home. The same census shows Lucinda Tucker (John A. Tucker's widow) as head of the household with five children living with her. This indicates that both Burk and Tucker died between 1860 and 1870.

Conclusion: Joseph Burk, a member of a Miscellaneous Arkansas Military Unit (Captain Bevins Independent Co., AR CAV), and John A. Tucker, a neighbor, were killed on September 6, 1864, by a squad of Confederate Soldiers or bush-whackers and were buried by their wives in a common grave in the Bolinger Cemetery.

Addenda: Sibyl Carter, who helped raise the funds for the granite marker, is a great granddaughter of John A. Tucker. Her grandfather is Robert S. Tucker who married Susan Lane Stansell. Her father was Joe Lee Holt who married Ellen (Ella) Tucker. Sibyl Holt married Vernon George Carter. My grandmother is Annette Tucker who is a sister of Robert S. Tucker.

Alva Burk, who assisted in the fundraising for the marker, was the grandson of the Burk (William Joseph Lafayette Burk) that is buried with John A. Tucker. Joseph Burk was born in 1815 in North Carolina. He married Sarah Felkins (b. 20 Jan 1822 KY). Sarah Burk died 19 August 1897 and is buried in the Lower Whorton Creek Cemetery, Madison County, Arkansas. Alva Burk is the son of John Burk, a son of Joseph Burk.

New Baptist Church - Lamartine Area

In 1857, residents of the Lamartine area of Columbia County decided to build a new Baptist church building and received commitments from several individuals to finance the construction.

The church apparently neared completion by July of 1858, since at that time additional sums were promised "for the purpose of covering the meeting house near Fountain Formbys with shingles."

The following was taken from the original 1857 document which is a part of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Collection, Riley-Hickingbotham Library, Ouachita Baptist University, Arkadelphia, AR. No changes have been made in spelling.

"We the undersigned do promise to pay to Mathew Davis or Fountain Formby or bearer the several amounts opposite our names By the First day of December eighteen hundred and fifty Eight for the purpose of building a Baptist Church in the vicinity of Lamartine.

Arkansas' 1861 Peace Society

In November 1861, Confederate authorities in Arkansas learned about an anti-war, perhaps pro-Union, secret organization, located primarily in the north central counties of the state. Governor Henry J. Rector called up of the county militia units to arrest the members of this organization, charged them with insurrection and forced many of them into Confederate regiments. Given the choice of joining Confederate regiments or being tried for insurrection, most joined; however, some did not and were later tried and released. Many were never captured and fled the state to join Union regiments outside the state, or to remain a noncombatant.

Four journal articles have appeared about the Arkansas Peace Society, and it is also covered in one book.¹ The material used for these articles has been the Official Records of the War of the Rebellion and documents out of the Kie Oldham Collection in the Arkansas History Commission. Other material has not been fully utilized.² This article has used this other material to compile a list of all those men whose names appear as suspects, or as charged, with membership in the Peace Society, in any of its various names.

I hope to do a scholarly article about the Peace Society, and would appreciate family history about any of the men listed here, or any men who are supposed to have belonged who are not listed here. The key to the attached chart of all the suspected Peace Society members' names follow.

NAMES- obtained from source listed under "PS Activity."

COUNTY-taken from 1860 census, or 1862 county tax records. If there is a difference, it is so noted and the later date is used. Occasionally the county of origin is noted in the PS Activity source.

CSA-This is the first (if there were more than one CSA enlistment) Confederate Unit the man was encouraged to join. For the 18th Arkansas Infantry, an asterisk (*) indi-

cates that his name also appears on the first extant muster roll of the successor organization, the 3rd Confederate Infantry, or that other evidence exists that he served with the 3rd Confederate. If the name did not transfer, it indicates he died, deserted or was furloughed during the interim. Of course, there were some who became good Confederate soldiers, or were Confederate sympathizers who just happened to join companies largely made up of Peace Society members. This may be particularly true of members of companies I and K, 18th (Marmaduke's) Arkansas Infantry who were not from the northern counties.

ENL-Enlistment date (SCA) is obviously the date he enlisted. This date is often interesting as it is evidence of when he was encouraged to join and who enlisted at the same time and place.

DIED-Interesting to note that so many died within the first six months of their Confederate service. It also points out the hardy, or the lucky, ones that survived the Civil War. Some also died while in Federal Service.

DESERT-Because so few of the PS members were dedicated secessionists and Confederates, many deserted at the first opportunity. It is interesting that, for some, the opportunity came late in the war.

UNION-Because they were Union sympathizers from the start, or, because their experiences had alienated them from the Confederacy--or maybe because it was the only alternative left, many joined the Federal forces. Some refuged in Missouri (or at least "north of the Ohio River"), some remained hidden near their homes until the war was over, or until they were killed.

ENL-Enlistment date USA. It is interesting to compare the desertion date with the enlistment date. If there is several months between the dates, one wonders what the man did during this time.

AGE-Included because it helps identify the individual (although the ages on the CSA

enlistment records are sometimes ten years younger than the census records). PS members impressed into CSA service were often older than the normal enlistee.

PS ACTIVITY-The letter designation refers to the end notes and cites the sources of the names, and a brief description of the activity.

PS ACTIVITY SOURCES

A- Albert W. Bishop, Loyalty on the Frontier, St. Louis: A. P. Studley, 1863.

Granted that this was published as Union propaganda, nevertheless the facts seem to be reliable and one can read past the adjectives. It is particularly valuable for Searcy County, with sketches of Searcy Countians Paris Strickland and John W. Morris.

B- Mrs. J. N. Bromley, Biography of John W. Morris, Marshall, Arkansas: 1916.

John W. Morris' story is typical of many a PS member. He worked with his daughter in the preparation of his biography and it is valuable for the source of the "Chain Gang" members whom he remembered accompanying him to Little Rock, and when some of them were killed in action. However, it should be noted that 45 years later he has added four names whose participation cannot be substantiated with other records.

C- Company I, 18th (Marmaduke's) Arkansas Infantry, enlisted December 18, 1861 at Little Rock. Contains the men from Searcy County who were captured and marched to Little Rock by the 45th *(Searcy County) Arkansas Militia. This is a useful cross reference to Morris' list. On January 231, 1862, this unit was joined by two Tennessee companies and, therefore, could no longer retain its Arkansas designation. It was redesignated the 3rd Confederate Infantry. Most of the PS members do not appear on the 3rd Confederate Infantry's rolls. A clue to whether they died, or successfully deserted, is given in their subsequent activity. An asterisk (*) marks their appearance on the 3rd Infantry rolls.

D- Company K 18 (Marmaduke's) Arkansas Infantry. Enlisted December 19, 1861 at Little Rock. This company was composed of those arrested north of the Buffalo River

from Carroll, Marion and Searcy counties, and was supplemented by men from Van Buren County who had been imprisoned in Little Rock earlier. An asterisk also marks their appearance on the 3rd CSA Infantry rolls.

E- Veda Mae Clemons, editor, History of Searcy County, Arkansas, Marshall, Arkansas: Retired Teachers Association, 1987. This volume contains a few family recollections about men who were in the PS or Chain Gang.

F- David Smith, George Smith deposition, November 26, 1861, in Capt. J. R. Homer Scott's Civil War Letters, J. B. Lemley, editor (Available from J.B. Lemley, 1120 North Detroit Avenue, Russellville, AR 72801 @\$5.) Hereinafter cited as Scott Letters. The Smith boys arrested the Faught brothers, from Tomahawk Township, Searcy County, and brought them before a Carroll County Justice of the Peace, accusing them of organizing a raid to release jailed PS members.


Book Reviews and Notices

Bobbie Jones McLane and Desmond Walls Allen

The following are reviews and/or announcements of book acquisitions for the Arkansas Genealogical Society. These books are permanently housed at the Arkansas History Commission, or in the local History and Genealogy Room of the Little Rock Public Library. The Society expresses its appreciation to the authors and contributors. In ordering copies of these books, please remember to say you saw the review in this publication!

CEMETERIES OF GREENE COUNTY, ARKANSAS, VOLUMES 1 AND 2, published by the Greene County Historical and Genealogical Society, 901 West Kingshighway, Paragould, AR 72450 (June 1988). Velo-bound with surname index, two volumes \$47.50. This compilation of the cemeteries of Greene Co., AR, includes all known cemeteries, and includes mention of those no longer used or which contain no markers. The Society did not attempt to ascertain any history or identify unmarked graves; however, if this information was available, it was utilized. Volume 1 contains 443 pages, and a map indicating the location of the cemeteries. Volume 2 contains 412 pages, which includes a surname index for both volumes. Total pages for both is 855. The individual tombstone inscriptions are listed alphabetically within each cemetery and are available as separate groupings. Write the Greene Co. Society for individual prices. (BJM)

CHOCTAW-CHICKASAW CITIZENSHIP COURT RELATIVE TO THE ENROLLMENT OF THE FIVE CIVILIZED TRIBES, 1898-1907 (1914), an instructional booklet by Charles Butler Barr, 1633 Claremont, Independence, MO 64052 was developed by Mr. Barr as a volunteer at the National Archives in Kansas City where he conducts a free Indian round table discussion each third Saturday. This booklet has been extracted by Mr. Barr from his *Guide to Sources of Indian Genealogy*. In researching the above records (Microfilm #7RA27), Barr notes that an unsuccessful Dawes Rolls search for a Choctaw or Chickasaw should not be abandoned before the Choc-



taw-Chickasaw Citizenship Court records are checked. Families are found in the Index for these court records that are not in the Dawes Index nor Final Rolls. These two rolls of microfilm 7RA27 "Lists of Applicants and Dockets of the Choctaw-Chickasaw Citizenship Court" are available for \$8.00 each from the Southwestern Regional Office of the National Archives in Fort Worth. (BJM)

THE DELCOUR ROAD, Nicholas B. Delcour and His Descendants 1780-1990 by Bill and Mary Delcour, 3739 Oakes Drive, Hayward, CA 94542, hardbound, indexed, 507 pages. This is a gift copy of the 1990 (final) printing of this book, which replaces the 1987 (preliminary) printing, previously sent us. At the time the first book was received, it was not prepared for sale, but for sharing with the "cousins" who assisted in research and for donation to historical and genealogical societies, and there is no indication that this second volume is for sale. Nicholas B. Delcour was born in France, enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1812, and removed to Washington Co., MO, where he spent the rest of his life. This new version contains all the information in the first book plus 2,382 additional descendant names, additional historical background and spouse lineage data, with 30 pages of photographs. The index is actually two alphabetical indices, the first for Nicholas B. Delcour's 6,192 descendants and the second for the surnames of spouses and mothers-in-law. (BJM)

GROSS FUNERAL HOME RECORDS, April 18, 1874 to May 30, 1921 (6759 Records) by Lewis C. Stephens, 113 Shady Lane, Hot Springs, AR 71901-9508, velo-bound, 101 pages, \$16.00. The oldest available funeral home records in Hot Springs are those kept by this funeral home, opened by James B. McCaffrey in April 1874, and continued after his death by Bernard Gross in 1886. This is an alphabetical listing of the 6759 records of James B. McCaffrey and Bernard "Billy" Gross, undertakers of Hot Springs, AR covering the period April 18, 1874 to May 30, 1921. Information given, in many instances, includes the name of the deceased, death date, by whom the funeral was ordered, age, any additional information such as cause of death, type coffin ordered, etc., cemetery in which buried, and costs. As these records pre-date the filing of death certificates in Arkansas, records of death for some of these individuals exist in no other document. This is a "companion" publication to *Caruth Funeral Home Records, Hot Springs, AR, 1909-1970*, published by Mr. Stephens in 1990, and adds to the volumes of City Death and Cemetery Records published by others for Hot Springs and Garland County. (BJM)

CLARK COUNTY, ARKANSAS OBITUARIES AND DEATH NOTICES 1869-1900 published in the *Arkadelphia, Arkansas Southern Standard Newspaper, Volume 1* compiled by Allen B. Syler, edited, indexed and published by Bobbie Jones McLane, 157 pages, soft-cover, full name index, \$20.00 (Order from Arkansas Ancestors, 222 McMahan Drive, Hot Springs, AR 71913) A tremendous amount of genealogical information is found in these early newspaper accounts and will be a boon to Arkansas researchers, particularly those in the Southwestern part of the State. These people lived primarily in Clark County, although there are frequent mentions of people from surrounding areas. In addition to the names of the deceased, the entries also include in many cases, the birthdate and former residence of the deceased, names of survivors, parents, and children, names of ministers, places of death and interment; citations to the date and generally, page and column number, are given for those who wish to search the original notice. Allen Syler has made a significant contribution to genealogical research in the Clark County area by placing these marvel-

ous records in a single source for researchers and Bobbie McLane has added greatly to her ever-growing, exceptional listing of Arkansas research materials. (DWA)

INDEX OF OBITUARIES APPEARING IN THE ARKANSAS GAZETTE JANUARY 1, 1990 TO JUNE 30, 1990 by Oscar G. Russell, CAE, 506 Loop Road, North Little Rock, AR 72116; 352 pages, spiral binding, \$25. What a wonderful idea! Some researchers in the coming years are going to be very excited about finding Mr. Russell's index. (A second volume for the latter half of 1990 is forthcoming.) With no access to any sort of index for our Arkansas state vital records, this volume will be very important for family historians. The book presents the material both in alpha order by name and by city name. The ages of the deceased persons are given and the *Gazette* citation. Attention librarians: this volume will be useful for researchers seeking statistical material. Now if we can just interest Mr. Russell in the *Gazette* obituary columns for the past 100 years or so... (DWA)

MATTHEW HOUSE AND HIS FAMILY, by Shirlene Chilton, 1225 Military Plaza, Benton, AR 72015; 19 pages plus facsimiles of documents, spiral binding, \$10 postpaid. Matthew House, a native of Sumner Co., Tennessee, settled in Saline County, Arkansas about 1855; he served in both the Mexican War and War Between the States. Source documents and lists of descendants are reproduced in this volume. (DWA)

SALINE COUNTY, ARKANSAS, 1870 CENSUS, by Shirlene Chilton and Virginia Prothro, 1225 Military Plaza, Benton, AR 72015; 108 pages, spiral binding, \$16 postpaid. This is a transcription in enumeration order with a surname index. There are added annotations from the mortality schedule, marriage records, and family information. (No source citations are given for the annotations.) (DWA)

MILITIA - 1866 CHRISTIAN COUNTY, MISSOURI by Helen C. Davenport; available from Christian County Museum and Historical Society, PO Box 442, Ozark, MO 65721; 42 pages, perfect bound, \$8. After the end of the War Between the States, Missouri

passed a new law regulating its militia which resulted in the compilation of rosters of soldiers listing names, ages, physical descriptions, marital status, residence and other information. This volume reproduces the 1866 roster in the same order in which it was recorded and in alpha order. (DWA)

JOSEPH WHITELEY, SR., AND HIS DESCENDANTS IN AMERICAN 1751 - 1990 by Dorris Easley Estes, presented to AGS by H. Laon Easley, Route 1, Box 56K, Moore, TX 78057, in the name of his grandfather, John Nelson Whiteley. Note: the author's address is Dorris Estes, Fiddler's Green, Route 2, Box 347, Frisco, TX 75034; 1,100 pages, limited edition. This book is an impressive collection of source documents and descendants. Allied family names are Easley, Honeycutt, Warren, Bunch and Allred. While the Modified Register System of numbering would have been so helpful, the author created yet another numbering scheme for the thousands of folks listed in the book. Most sources are cited and many photos and copies of documents are included. (DWA)

Heart of the Lakes Publishing, PO Box 299, Interlaken, NY 14847, has sent two of their books for the AGS book notices. **IMMIGRANTS IN MADISON COUNTY, NEW YORK 1815 - 1860** by Isabel Bracy, 120 pages, \$10 plus \$2 postage, contains a list of immigrants gathered from various county sources with additional information about the factors that caused people to move from Europe to the United States. **WHY ARE THERE NO TALL GRANDMA'S?: A Guide to assist you in researching your family history** by Scott B. Chase, 127 pages, \$14.85 postpaid, is a simplistic look at family history research. Unfortunately, there is little mention of the importance of citing sources for each piece of information. The example family group sheet provided in the book is a poor model as it lists for sources only a fuzzy "personal interviews." Cute title, some interesting points to consider, but not something to give a beginning researcher. (DWA)

COCKMAN FAMILY HISTORY by Margaret Cockman Kitchel and Dwain L. Kitchel, is available from Tennessee Valley Publishing, PO Box 52527, Knoxville, TN

37950, 600+ pages, hardbound, \$60 postpaid. The book lists descendants of Joseph Cockman of Moore County, NC. Sources are noted; photos, maps and document reproductions add to the interest of the material. The LDS Church's Personal Ancestral File computer software was used to organize the family data and it is an easy-to-use book. (DWA)

THE JONESES OF KENTUCKY'S CALLOWAY AND MARSHALL COUNTIES, 1820-1910, by Henry Earl Jones, MD, PO Box 1106, Fairhope, AL 36533; 500 pages, softbound, \$18.45 postpaid. Jones is one of those common surnames so difficult to research. Mr. Jones has taken the approach of researching ALL the Joneses in his area of interest in order to follow his own family lines (he has TWO Jones lines). He used a computerized database of information and made extensive use of the land records. This volume will be a dream-come-true for some Jones researcher lucky enough to be descended from the Jones of this area of Kentucky. (DWA)

ABSTRACT OF THE SALINE COUNTY, ARKANSAS CIRCUIT COURT COMMON LAW BOOK "B" 1842-1854 abstracted by Eddie G. Landreth; available from Saline County History and Heritage Society, Inc., PO Box 221, Bryant, AR 72022-0221; 163 pages, spiral binding, \$18 postpaid. Eddie Landreth has struck again! How fortunate are the folks interested in Saline County that Eddie Landreth painstakingly and accurately abstracts so many of the old records of the county and donates the results to SCHHS. This particular source is one of those difficult to search and low on the priority list for most researchers but it contains very interesting information. All sorts of civil litigation, criminal cases, even naturalization records are listed in the book. (DWA)

A BURROWS FAMILY HISTORY by Marian Carter Ledgerwood, PO Box 8081, Hot Springs Village, AR 71909-0081, 124 pages, soft cover, full index. This compilation is comprised of three parts: Section I is a history of Thomas Burrows (c1820-c1880) and his descendants (43 pages). Thomas Burrows m. Ellender Mackey in Shelby Co., TN 1840. They came to White Co., AR

c1855. Their son, John Wesley Burrows married Roberta Pipe in Lonoke Co., AR 1 Oct. 1882 and lived for a time in England, AR, moving to Arkadelphia, AR c1892. Section II is a study of other families of Burrows (and other spellings), whose records were encountered during the search for the family of Thomas Burrows. (31 pages). Appendix I contains transcripts of records concerning Thomas Burrows and his son, John Wesley Burrows. (9 pages) and Appendix II consists of Abstracts of records found in various county seats, state archives, and libraries concerning various families of Burrows (an variant spellings). (34 pages).
